The same Advices add, that the Elector of Cologne had begun to cause his Orders which he lately published in his Dominions for seizing all the Prussians of what Condition soever, to be put in Execution, by stopping and confining a Prussian Officer with three Recruits for the Regiment of tall Grenadiers, as they were passing through Munster. Whereas on the 27th of March last past, at Night, the Surveyor of His Majesty's Customs at Deal, with eleven other Officers, endeavouring to prevent the Running of a great Quantity of Goods newly landed in St. Margaret's Bay, and to seize the same, were opposed by between Twenty and Thirty Persons armed, who killed Richard Hill, one of the Custom-house Boatmen, and very much beat and bruised three others of the Officers: For the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons who were concerned in so notorious a Murder of an Officer in the Execution of his Duty, his Majesty is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one or more of them, (except the Person or Persons who actually murder'd the said Hill) who will discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a further Encouragement for such Discovery, His Majesty is also pleased to promise to any of them, or to any other Person or Persons who shall discover the Murderers, or either of them, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof, a Reward of Fifty Pounds for each Person who shall be apprehended and convicted, to be paid on the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders
