Petersbourg, April 1, O. S.

COUNT Gallowin, who was the Russian Minister in Sweden, arrived here the 28th of last Month. He is one of the Members of the new Commission that are examining the Affairs of the Admiralty.

Stockholm, April 5, O. S. M. Funk, upper Master of the Ceremonies, has obtained his Swedish Majesty's Consent to resign his Post to M. Cronstrom, upon Condition that his Son, who is now upon his Travels, should succeed M. Cronstrom as under Master of the Ceremonies, and M. Broman is appointed to officiate during his Absence. M. Bestuchef, Minister from the Czarina, arrived here the 1st Instant, and has notified his Arrival to all the Foreign Ministers.

Copenhagen, April 26, N. S. The King of Denmark's Departure for Norway is deferred, and some here begin to think that the Voyage will not take Place this Summer, though the necessary Orders for that Expedition were given, and the Preparations made with all diligence. Some are of Opinion that Prince William of Hesse intending to come hither in his Way to Stockholm, the King only carries a while to receive and entertain his Highness.

Hague, May 2, N. S. The Advices concerning the Death of the Elector of Mentz have been various here for some Days, but the Palatine Minister was informed Yesterday from his Court of the Certainty of it, and that he died on the 18th Instant at Breslaw, not the 10th as it was first reported. After many Conferences between Count Sinzendorff and the Deputies of the States to adjust the Reimbursement of Six Millions of Florins due to this Country upon the Security of the Tolls on the Scheldt, M. General Post-Office, London, April 24, 1732.

Whereas the Post Boy bringing the Bristol and Gloucester Mails to London, was set upon and robbed by a single Person on Foot, between Two and Three a Clock this Morning, two Miles before he came to Hounslow:

The Post Master General thinks proper to make it publicly known, that whoever shall apprehend the Person who committed this Robbery, will upon his Conviction be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, besides the Reward by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen. Or if any one Accomplice in the said Robbery, shall make a Discovery of the Person who committed the Fact, such Accomplice will be intitled to the said Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have the King's most gracious Pardon.

The Person who committed the Robbery was mask'd, and is described to be a little Man in a whitish Shag Coat, with black Stockings, and seem'd to have a Wig on. He carried off the following Bags.
