Vienna, April 26, N. S.

PRINCE Pio is nominated by the Emperour to go Ambassadour to the Republick of Venice, in the Room of the late Count de Bolagnos. Count Kuffstein is appointed to go to Mentz, to assist as his Imperial Majesty's Commissioner at the Choice of a new Elector. Yesterday the Emperour, accompanied by the Duke of Lorrain, set out from hence for Laxembourg, whither the Empress went soon after: Their Imperial Majesties will reside there till the 22d of next Month, when they will make a Progress to Carlsbad.

Stockholm, April 19, O. S. This Court went into Mourning Yesterday for the Prince of Baden Dourlach and Wirtemberg. The Dutchess Dowager of Mecklenbourg sets out the 25th Instant, and their Swedish Majesties will accompany her some Part of the Way.

Hague, May 9, N. S. The States of the Province of Holland consented on the 7th Instant to continue the State of War upon the same Foot at it was the last Year, Amsterdam and Leyden having desisted from their Opposition and consented thereto. It is not doubted but Zealand will follow their Example. The States having finished that Business, design to separate To-morrow till a new Convocation. The Minister from the States at the Court of Berlin writes, that upon a Report of the Elector Palatine being dead, the King of Prussia had given Orders to his Troops

to be in Readiness to march at the first Command, with Tents, Baggage, &c. and that two Regiments of Foot were actually on the March for the Country of Cleves. Letters from Constantinople advise, that the Persians and Turks having disagreed in the Execution of their Treaty, they came to Blows, and that the Turks had the Advantage.
