*Petersbourg, May 6, O. S.*

**T**HE 27th of last Month two Chinese Ambassadors arrived here, to compliment the Czarina on her Accession to the Throne. The next Day, which was the Anniversary of her Majesty's Coronation, they had their first Audience of her Majesty, and bowed their Heads to the Ground before they presented their Credentials, then made a short Speech, which was answered by Count Osterman, and then the Ambassadors bowed again three Times to the Ground; and the Audience being ended, they were conducted into another Room, being desired to stay and dine at Court, as were likewise all the Foreign Ministers. The Czarina dined in Publick with the Princess Elizabeth, and the young Dutchess of Mecklenbourg. All the Foreign and Russian Ministers, and the Ladies, stood till her Majesty had dined; after which, the Foreign Ministers were conducted into another Apartment to dine with the Ladies of the Court. The Court appeared very splendid on this Occasion, for hardly any thing was seen but the finest Gold and Silver Stuffs that could be got in Europe, and Jewels in great Numbers. The Great Marshal Count Levenwolde, who was a Knight of the Black Eagle, was made a Knight of St. Andrew, and his Brother General Count Levenwolde was declared Great Master of the Horse. At Night there was a Ball at Court, and a fine Firework upon the River, with Illuminations, which continued for three Nights. All the Foreign Ministers were invited the 4th Instant to come to Court in the Afternoon, to the Marriage

of Major Biron, the Great Chamberlain's Brother, who was married to the late Prince Menzikoff's Daughter; after the Ceremony was over, there was a Ball and Supper at Court, as there was also the next Day.

*Stockholm, May 17, O. S.* This Court went into Mourning on Sunday last for Eight Days for the Elector of Mentz. The Queen goes to Carlsberg next Saturday for the Summer, by which Day Prince William of Hesse is expected there, and his Swedish Majesty sets out To-morrow to meet his Royal Highness.

*Copenhagen, May 31, N. S.* Prince William of Hesse having staid a Day or two at Friedensbourg, set out for Stockholm this Morning. The King of Denmark has made him a Present of a Sett of Coach Horses. Count Seckendorff went from hence on the 29th, taking Friedensbourg in his Way.

*Berlin, May 31, N. S.* The Queen of Prussia came hither this Evening from Potzdam, and the King is expected To-morrow. The general Review, which is made in the Neighbourhood of this Town every Year, is fixed for the latter End of next Week, but will not consist of so many Regiments as formerly. The Duke of Bevern is expected here in a few Days, as also the Prince and Princess of Bareith.

*Hambourg, June 3, N. S.* We have received Advices from Copenhagen, that a Treaty of Friendship, on the Foot of a mutual Guaranty, was signed there on the 26th of last Month, by Count Seckendorff Minister from the Emperour, M. Brackel Minister from the Czarina, and the Ministers of the Danish Privy Council. Count Seckendorff arrived here last Night, and intends in a few Days to set out for Berlin.
