Dantzick, Sept. 3.

From Warsaw of the 26 instant they write, that the former news of *Cambrico's* being Besieged by the Turks, proves a mistake, it being certain, they were not according to the last advice, passed over the River *Nes- tre*, the Bridge which the Turks built over it at *Cochyn* having been twice broken down by the high waters. The Crown-Generall is retreated with the remainder of the Army, not above 5000 Men to *Lembergh*. The King is still at *Fanowits*, expecting the Militia of the Kingdom there;

Rome, Aug. 12. We are told of Orders that have been some time since sent to Signior, *Albritio*, Nuncio at the Court at *Vienna*, not in the least to concern himself in the Treaty concluding between the Emperor and some Princes of the Empire: His Holiness continues still his great care for the composing the differences between the Duke of *Savoy* and the State of *Genoua*, and the rather, because it is feared that this war may at length draw all *Italy* into a quarrel: The State of *Venice* hath in the mean time as well here as at several other Courts, proposed a League for the preservation of the peace of *Italy*, though without making as yet any great advance therein.

Madrid, Aug. 17. The Dutch Ambassador here is preparing for his publick Audience, and in the mean time hath several conferences with these Ministers. The 14 instant parted hence Don *Antonio de Mendosa* for *Genoua*, where he is to reside in quality of Envoye Extraordinary on the part of this Crown; his Instructions are at present, as is said, to use all possible endeavors for the restoring of peace between the Duke of *Savoy* and that State. Ditto, Aug. 31. On the twentieth instant about nine a clock at night, happened in the *Plaza Mayor* of this Town, a very great Fire, which in few hours burnt to the ground, all the Pile of Buildings, called the *Panaderia* (being the Kings Houle, but Inhabited by several private Families) with many other dwellings backwards to the *Gate Mayor*, which is

supposed contained two thousand Inhabitants, whereof about thirty were killed and burnt, besides many others hurt, who assisted at the quenching of the Fire.

Nitz, Aug. 28. Since the taking of *Oneglia* (which appears to have been betrayed) by the *Genoueses*, they have plundered and burnt the *Brigge*, a small Town belonging to the Duke of *Savoy*. Yesterday arrived at *Villa Franca*, the French Gallies, being nine in all, under the Command of Monsieur de *Mause*; It is said they are to put up the *Savoy Colours*, and act according to the Orders of our Duke. We are at present fortifying this place, and putting things into a good posture of defence. We have just now advice, That a party of ours have taken and burnt *Picua*, belonging to *Genoua*.

Minden, Sept. 5. From *Erford* we have advice, that this day the Imperial Troops will reach that place, and so continue their march towards the *Rhyn*.

Rotterdam, Sept. 6. The work of reformation of Magistrates in all the Towns of this Province, as well as that of *Zealand* being now almost concluded, we would willingly hope to live in more peace and quietness then formerly, though the Commonalty pressed by their wants, which daily increase upon them, by reason of the interruption of all Trade, continue very unquely, and as forward to lay hold of any light occasion to promote a disturbance; in the mean time we hear very little of the States, all affairs being at present wholly managed by his Highness the Prince of *Orange*, much to the satisfaction of the people, who seem to desire nothing more, then to see all those of the late-Faction wholly routed out of the Government, to which purpose the Burgers of *Delf* have lately made an address to the Prince, and will it is thought, be followed by the rest of the Towns. From *Dort* we hear, that those Inhabitants continue to persecute in a very strange manner, the Memory and Relations of the late *Ruwaert van Putten*; that they had lately fallen upon his Son, as he passed through the Streets, and used him very severely, because he was in Mourning for his Father, tearing his clothes from his back, and farther telling him, that he deserved not to live, for expressing any mark of sorrow for such a Traitor, though his Father. Our Fleet we are told lies off of *Schoonvelt*.

Hague, Sept. 8. The disorders in all the Towns of this Province encrease daily, and it is feared will continue so to do, if not timely appeased by his Highness, who hath now the whole power of making and altering of Laws in all places in his own hands. Here are still in Town the Deputies of several places, concerning the nomination of new Magistrates by the Prince, whose return they expect here. We are told that the Army is in a day or two to march from *Bodegrave* on some considerable designe, which as yet is kept a secret. At *Amsterdam* they have raised 800 Soldiers and 400 Seamen, who were sent out the third instant upon some exploit. It is reported here, that part of the Elector of *Brandenburgh's* Forces are on their march towards *Westphalia*, and that the Bishop of *Munster*
