Minden, Sept. 5. From Erford we have advice, that this day the Imperial Troops will reach that place; and so continue their march towards the Rhyn.

Rotterdam, Sept. 6. The work of reformation of Magistrates in all the Towns of this Province, as well as that of Zealand being now almost concluded, we would willingly hope to live in more peace and quietness then formerly, though the Commonalty pressed by their wants, which daily increase upon them, by reason of the interruption of all Trade, continue very unruly, and as forward to Jay hold of any light occasion to promote a disturbance, in the mean time we hear very little of the States, all affairs being at present wholly managed by his Highness the Prince of Orange, much to the satisfaction of the people, who seem to defire nothing more, then to see all those of the late Faction wholly routed out of the Government, to which purpole the Burgers of Delf have lately made an address to the Prince, and will it is thought, be followed by the rest of the Towns.
