ON Tuesday the 8th Instant the Deputies from the City of Hambourg, sent by that Republick to compliment the King on his safe Arrival in his German Dominions, arrived here, and had on Friday their Audience of his Majesty. The same Friday, being the 11th, Sir Cyril Wych, Bart. His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Hans-Towns, came hither, and waited the next Day on His Majesty at Herrenhausen, who received him very graciously; and the Deputies of the City of Bremen had the same Morning their Audience of the King. On Saturday the 12th, in the Evening, Prince George of Hesse arrived here, and on Sunday the 13th waited on His Majesty at Herrenhausen: His Highness is lodged at a House, which is by the King's Order always prepared for the Reception of Foreign Princes, and is attended by the Officers and Servants of the King's Household. Prince Nassau Siegen, who has the Command of a Regiment in the Service of the States General, arrived here last Saturday, and in the Evening went to Herrenhausen to pay his Respects to the King. Count Lenard, one of the Gentlemen of the Bedchamber to the King of Poland, came hither on Sunday last, being sent on the Part of the King his Master to compliment His Majesty upon his Arrival in his German Dominions. Yesterday Morning His Majesty made a general Review, upon the Burghers Common, of the Forces cantoned in this Neighbourhood, consisting of 17 Squadrons and 12 Battallions, and His Majesty intends to review the respective Regiments separately, having begun this Morning with the Dragoons. Yesterday in the Evening a French Comedy was acted at the Theatre in the new Orangerie at Herrenhausen.

Hague, July 18, N. S. 'Tis written from Vienna, that Count Visconti, First Minister to the Archdutchess Governess of the Austrian Netherlands, has by the Emperour been declared Viceroy of Naples, in the Room of Count Harrach the Father; and that Count Harrach the Son is declared First Minister to

the Archdutchess Governess. To Day came Advice from Bruffels, that a Dutch Ship lately seized at Ostend, by way of Reprizal for the Seizure of one of the Ostend Company's Ships in India, has, upon Application to the Archdutchess, been ordered to be forthwith released. The Grand Pensionary having made known his Intention to retire, his five Years Administration ending the 17th Instant, the States of Holland deliberated thereupon last Week, and resolved to desire him to continue five Years longer; which Resolution having been presented to him last Saturday, he accepted thereof. M. Lovifius, on the Part of the King of Prussia, and M. Duncan the Prince of Orange's Secretary, on the Part of his Highness, have notified to the President of the States, that his Prussian Majesty and the Prince were come to an Agreement upon their respective Claims from the late King William's Will, and promise to communicate to the States the Conditions of the Treaty in a few Days. The Prince of Orange is expected here this Week, to make his Application to the States, as Executors of King William's Will, for Possession of his Part of the Inheritance.

Whitehall, July 11.

This Day arrived an Express from the Earl Waldegrave, his Majesty's Ambassadour Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary at the Court of France, with Letters from Mr. Keene his Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary at Seville, dated July the 4th, N. S. giving an Account, that on the 27th of last Month the Spanish Galleys were got into the Bay of Oran, but the Fleet was at Two Leagues Distance, being detained by Calms; that they hoped however to be able to land the Troops the Day following; that the Moors had fired two Eight Pounders at the Galleys as they were Fishing in the Bay; that about Twenty Five Tents were seen at a Distance, judged to be capable of holding 200 Men each, but few or no People appeared near the Town: And that Collonel Giudice arrived on the 4th Instant with Letters from the General Count Montemar, dated the 30th of June, at One in the Morning, giving an Account, that

19th at break of Day he began to land 6000 Men without Opposition, and at Night had finish'd the whole Debarcation, except that of a few Horſe belonging to the Prince's Regiment; that as the first 6000 Men were landing, they ſaw about 600 Moorish Horſe and ſome Peaſants, upon which the General detached Don Lucas Patino with three Companies of Grenadiers, and Don Juan Pizuela with 200 Horſe, but the Moors fled from them, and killed two Grenadiers who advanced further than the reſt, and wounded three others, which is all the Loſs the Spaniards have ſuſtained; that the Moors upon the Mountains conſiſt of about 17000 Men; but as they did not fall upon the firſt Party of Spaniards that landed, the Count Montemar did not expect to find any other Oppoſition than what he ſhould meet with the next Day in attacking the Fort of Mazalquivir, which being cut into a Rock, and ſo low that it cannot be battered in Breach, is thought to be capable, with about 400 Turks, and Proviſions in Proportion, to employ the Spaniards all the Month of July before they can make themſelves compleatly Maſters of Oran.
