THE 30th of last Month his Highness Prince Ernest of Bevern took his Leave of his Majesty, and set out the same Day for Brunswick, being extremely satisfied with the Reception he had met with during his Stay here. M. Kitzell, who is sent hither on the Part of the Duke of Saxe Eisenach, to compliment the King on his Arrival in his German Dominions, had the 31st his Audience of his Majesty. Letters from Berlin of the 29th of July, N. S. advise, that his Prussian Majesty set out the 27th early in the Morning for the Frontiers of Silesia and Bohemia, to have an Interview with the Emperor. This Morning between Seven and Eight a-Clock, the King, accompanied by his Highness Prince George of Hesse, and attend d by my Lord Harrington, the Foreign Ministers, and several other Persons of Distinction, went to Butzenburg Forest, where the Peasants had brought into the Toils several wild Beasts, and his Majesty having diverted himself with shooting some wild Boars, Foxes, and Hares, returned about Seven a-Clock in the Evening to Herrenhausen.

Hague, Aug. 5, N. S. The King of Prussia and the Prince of Nassau Orange having lately concluded an Accommodation between themselves upon their several Claims to the Inheritance of the late King William, agreed to notify the same by Letters to the States General, which were presented to their High Mightinesses on the 1st Instant. The same Day the Prince of Nassau Orange arrived here, and has since been with the Principal Persons in the Administration of this Republick, who have returned his Visits.
