THE 3d Instant in the Evening, his Highness Prince George of Hesse took his Leave of his Majesty, and dined Yesterday with Count Platen, and then set out for Butzaw, to make a Visit to his Sister the Dutches Dowager of Mecklenbourg. Yesterday in the Afternoon Count Degenfelt, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Prussia to the Court of Great Britain, arrived here from England. This Morning M. Dieden, his Majesty's Minister as Elector, to the Emperor, returned from hence to Prague, where the Imperial Court now resides. M. Bruner, who came hither on the Part of the Duke of Holstein, to compliment the King on his Arrival in his German Dominions, took his Leave of his Majesty last Night, and set out this Morning for the Court of the Duke his Master.

Hague, Aug. 8, N. S. The Prince of Nassau Orange, who designed to have passed Ten or Twelve Days here, having received an Express Yesterday from an extraordinary Assembly of the States of Friesland, set out this Morning in order to repair thither. Letters that came in to Day from Seville advise, that a strong Garrison being to be left in Oran, the rest of the Spanish Forces were about to return to Spain, Orders being already given for embarking the Horse.

Whitehall, July 21, 1732.

Whereas an anonymous Letter dated the 17th of July, 1731, was delivered into the Hands of Mr. Buckley, of Great James-street, by a Person unknown, on Monday Night last, between the Hours of Ten and Eleven, threatening to set the said Mr. Buckley's House on Fire, in case he did not leave the Sum of Forty Gui-

neas near some Trees behind Mr. Yates's Booths in Moorfields early the next Morning. And whereas a Letter dated June the 7th, 1732, and signed F. T. S. L. W. M. G. B. S. W. T. S. R. F. R. M. W. P. F. F. R. S. and T. O. was likewise sent to Mr. Fairchild, of Great Queen-street, by the Penny Post, requiring him to leave Twenty Guineas in the Place above-mentioned, and threatening, in case of Refusal, to set his House on Fire. And whereas another Letter, dated the 11th of July, 1732, and signed T. M. was delivered to the said Mr. Fairchild's Servant by a Boy unknown, containing the same threatening Expressions, and repeating the same Demand: Her Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in so heinous a Crime, is pleased to promise His Majesty's most gracious Pardon to any one or two of them, who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
