Seville, July 25, N. S.

ON the 19th Instant the Marquess de la Paz, Secretary of State, wrote a Letter to Mr. Keene, his Britannick Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary at this Court, by the King of Spain's Order, desiring that as his Catholick Majesty has at present no Minister actually residing at the Court of Great Britain, Mr. Keene would acquaint the King his Master, in his Catholick Majesty's Name, with the Conquest of Oran, with all its Forts, and the Castle of Mazalquivir, not doubting but his Britannick Majesty would receive with Pleasure the News of this happy Success of his Catholick Majesty's Arms against the Infidels, and would share in the Joy that it has given him. The Count de Montijo, his Catholick Majesty's Ambassadour to the King of Great Britain, set out from hence the 12th Instant for Madrid where he intends to stay about three Weeks, and then to set forward on his Journey to England. The Right Honourable the Earl of Albemarle arrived here on the 20th Instant, and the next Day was presented to their Catholick Majesties, the Prince and Princess of Asturias, and the rest of the Royal Family by Mr. Keene, and met with a most gracious Reception. His Lordship has had a Visit from several Grandees and other Persons of Distinction, and was entertained at Dinner by his Excellency M. Patino, Governour of the Finances and Secretary of State. To-morrow his Lordship sets out by Land for Gibraltar, having received the necessary Passports from this Court for that Purpose.

Hanover, Aug. 13, N. S. The 10th in the Morning Sir Cyril Wich, Bart. his Majesty's

Envoy Extraordinary to the Hans Towns; returned to his Post at Hambourg. Walter Titley, Esq; his Majesty's Resident at the Court of Denmark, having obtained the King's Leave to pay his Duty to his Majesty here, arrived the same Day in the Afternoon from Copenhagen, and that Evening waited on his Majesty at Herrenhausen, who received him very graciously. The King has fixed on the 26th Instant for his Journey to Celle, where his Majesty will stay four or five Days and review the Troops quartered in that Neighbourhood; and from thence his Majesty intends to go to the Gohrde.

Hague, Aug. 15, N. S. We have Advice that the King of Prussia arrived the 30th of last Month at Glodrop, a Hunting-Seat, where he was received and complimented in the Emperour's Name by one of the Lords of his Imperial Majesty's Bedchamber: Soon after which, the Emperour and the King of Prussia had an Interview at Glumitz, where his Prussian Majesty dined with their Imperial Majesties, sitting at the Left Hand of the Emperess, who had the Emperour at her Right. From thence they all repaired to Prague, where his Prussian Majesty was treated at Dinner the next Day by Prince Eugene of Savoy. The States of the Province of Holland are summoned to meet on Wednesday next. The Great Pensionary being confined to his Bed by Indisposition, will hardly be able to assist in their Assembly. The Prince of Nassau Orange returned hither to Day from Friesland. During his short Stay there, the States of that Province came to several Resolutions concerning the repairing the Timber-work of their Diques. The Fubbs Yacht is arrived at Rotterdam, having brought over the Lord Euston, Son to the Duke of Grafton, who is come hither.

Whereas an anonymous Letter dated the 17th of July, 1731, was delivered into the Hands of Mr. Buckley, of Great James-street, by a Person unknown, on Monday Night last, between the Hours of Ten and Eleven, threatening to set the said Mr. Buckley's House on Fire, in case he did not leave the Sum of Forty Guineas near some Trees behind Mr. Yates's Booths in Moorfields early the next Morning. M. was delivered to the said Mr. Fairchild's Servant by a Boy unknown, containing the same threatening Expressions, and repeating the same Demand: Her Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in so heinous a Crime, is pleased to promise His Majesty's most gracious Pardon to any one or two of them, who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices; so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
