Petersbourg, July 23.

ON the 21st Instant the Chinese Ambassadors had their Audience of Leave of the Czarina in the Great Hall of the Palace; the Czarina was seated on a Throne under a Canopy, having on the Imperial Robe, and the Crown on her Head: These Ambassadors are preparing to set out in a few Days on their Return to their own Country. An Ambassadour is expected from the Sophy of Persia Schach Thamas, who having broken the Peace which had been lately concluded in his Name with the Turks, has taken the Field again with a considerable Army.

Dresden, Aug. 4. We have Advice from Warfaw, that a Camp is formed at Villa Nova, where a Tent was pitched for his Polish Majesty, who had caused Universalia to be published throughout the Kingdom for the holding of a General Dyet on the 28th of September next. The Count de Leuwendolde, the Russian Minister, having had an Audience of his Polish Majesty, had notified to him the Conclusion of the Treaty lately made at Copenhagen between the Czarina, the Emperour, and the King of Denmark.
