Constantinople, August 2.

THE Plague which rages in these Parts, and carries off Abundance of People in this City and its Neighbourhood, the ill News we have of our Affairs in Perlia, and the Disposition the People shew here to raise Tumults, have spread a general Consternation among us. The Divan meets often to consult of Means for putting Things upon a better Foot, but there are great Divisions among the Chiefs of that Council. The Aga of the Janizaries, a Son-in-Law and Favourite of the Grand Signior, who was lately practifing to incense his Highness against the Grand Vizier, has been prevented by that First Minister, and turned out of Employment. Men are continually pressed for Soldiers to be sent to serve in Persia; but the Turks have so general an Aversion to that War, that most of the Troops ordered thither desert in their March. It is rumoured that an Express is arrived from the Bashaw of Babylon, with Advice, that the Persians have befieged that Place, and that unless the Porte fend him speedy and powerful Succours, he shall not be able to defend it long.

Hague, Sept. 12, N.S. 'Tis advised from

Hanover in Letters of the 9th Instant, that the King of Great Britain continued there in perfect Health; and His Majesty designing to set out from thence the 22d Instant, the usual Guards for attending him in his Passage through asked by M. d'Ayrolle His Majesty's Resident here; accordingly Orders have been iffued for their marching forthwith to lye in Parties upon the Roads for guarding His Majesty.
