Vienna, October 22.

THE 20th Instant a Council of State was held, in which Count Althan took the Oath for the Office of Master of the Horse to his Imperial Majesty. Prince Maximilian of Hesse arrived here some Days ago, and is gone to make a Visit to Prince Eugene at his Seat at Hoff in Hungary. It is said that Prince Maximilian will have the Regiment vacant by the Death of Felt-Marshal Count Zumjungen. The Duke of Lorrain is expected here towards the End of this Month from Presbourg. By Letters from Turkey we have confirmed Advices of the Defeat of a Body of 24000 of the Ottoman Troops by the Persians, but they bring no Particulars of it.

Copenhagen, Oct. 28, N. S. The King of Denmark having invited Count Seckendorff the Emperour's Minister to Friedensburg on the 22d Instant, was pleased then to present him with the new Order instituted upon the late Anniversary of the Marriage of their Danish Majesties: His Excellency on that Occasion has been complimented by all the Nobility of the Court.

Brussels, Oct. 30. The Count de Callenberg gave Yesterday a magnificent Entertainment to the Prince of Nassau Orange, and to several Persons of Distinction, which was followed with a Ball at Night. The Prince Hereditary of Bevern arrived the same Day in this City.

Hambourg, Oct. 31. The Magistrates of this City have transmitted to the Court of Vienna a Memorial concerning the Merchandizes lately arrived here from Cadiz, the Sale whereof is suspended by Order of the Emperour; in which they pretend to prove that the Offenders are no ways interested in the said Goods. Letters from Dresden advise, that the King of Poland being arrived there, Couriers were immediately dispatched to Warlaw, Munich, and Paris; that Orders were sent to all the Colonels to augment each Company with 10 Men; and in pursuance thereof they had already begun to raise Recruits in Saxony.

Hague, Nov. 4, N. S. The States General having written a Letter to the Prince of Nassau-Orange, relating to his Demand of having the Effects he claims by Inheritance from the late King William delivered to him, his Highness's Answer was Yesterday presented to their High Mightinesses: And the Prince himself is expected here next Week, to hasten the Conclusion of that Affair.

Whereas a Letter was received on the 29th of August last, by George Davis, Sen. and Benjamin Wilkinson, Master Cloth Workers of London, subscribed, Us the Journeymen Cloth Workers of London, threatening, that in Case their Wages were not advanced, they would Murder the said Davis and Wilkinson, and the rest of the Master-Cloth Workers, or set their Houses on Fire; and whereas on the 2d of this Month, about Seven in the Evening, the Work Shop of Benjamin Barnes,

of the Parish of St. Gregory's near St. Paul's, Cloth Worker, was set on Fire, by which great Part of his House and Goods were consumed; and there being great Reason to suspect that some of the Journeymen Cloth Workers did, pursuant to the said threatening Letter, set the said Barnes's House on Fire: His Majesty for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in so heinous a Crime, is pleased to promise His Majesty's most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
