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Edenburgh, Sept. 12.

I Have not troubled you of late with the accounts of what hath been doing here, since I know that the news of the actions of Fleets and Armies wherein we have so great concern, hath swallowed up the consideration of all things else. But I must now tell you, that the Parliament of this Kingdom have been constantly busie since the Lord Commissioners coming hither, except for one fortnight, and that they have past many excellent Laws, to the great satisfaction of the whole Kingdom, and all with very great unanimity in the Parliament, a List whereof I send you by this. Now the Parliament is Adjourned to the second Wednesday of June 1673. and his Grace the Lord Commissioner is preparing for his return to Court, after he hath seen all things concerning the security of the Kingdom ordered in Council, which will be in few days.

Besides these publick Acts, there are many private Acts of great Justice, and great concern to the Par-ties, of which I think it not necessary to send a List,

but this lets you see, that this Session of Parliament hath been very close at work, and that our Constitu-tion is expeditious.

Warsaw, Aug. 24. There Majesties are still at *Fa-nowitz*, and will continue there till the 30 instane, by which time it is hoped the Nobility will be-gin to appear in the Field, and in the interim, a Bridge of Boats is making over the *Vistula*, for the passage of the Nobility of those Palatinates that lie on the other side. Our Magistrates taking notice that a great many of the Inhabitants here, were up-on the news of the approach of the Turkish Forces, retired with their Families and Goods towards *Dantzick*, and those other parts, to avoid the dan-ger, which they apprehended now threatens this King-dom, have caused several Edicts to be published, by which they forbid any Inhabitant whatsoever to remove from hence under pain of confiscation of all their Goods or Estates. Two Turks having been lately taken near *Bressaw*, they declare that the Ottoman Army (which they left part on this, and part on the other side of the *Nestre*) was very numerous, under the Command of the Grand Vi-zier. The Grand Marechal *Sobierski* is still at *Lim-bergh*, endeavoring to recruit his Forces there, which at present are in a very ill condition. It is said that the King having written to the Elector of *Brandenburgh* concerning the succors he is obliged to send this Crown, in case of any danger from the Turks; that the said Elector hath promised to have 1000 Foot and 500 Horse ready for us against the middle of the next month, but this does not satisfy our Ministers, his Electoral Highness being obli-ged by Treaty, to furnish 6000 Men effective upon demand. The Cossacks in the *Ukrain* who have al-ways adhered to the interest of this Crown, under the Command of *Hanenko*, have lately obliged them-selves anew, by a solemn Oath, to live and die for the defence of the same.

Ditto, Sept. 2. The Nobility begin now to ap-pear at *Fanowitz*, those of *Lithuania* are most ar-rived there, and the rest daily follow. Yesterday the Nobility of the Palatinate of *Lenicienski*, consist-ing of 15 Troops, passed by here towards *Fano-witz*; The Nobility of *Cracovia* and *Sandomiria* are ready to march, and only expect first the Nobility of *Great Poland*; This gives us new courage, and makes us hope, that after all, we may see this King-dom in some posture of defence. The news concern-ing the Siege of *Caminiac*, is confirmed again; that the Turks had Stormed the place three times succes-sively, but were beaten off with considerable lofs, That they had thereupon quitted the Siege, and as was thought, taken other resolutions for their pro-ceedings. The *Muscovy* Ambassadors are arrived at the Court at *Fanowitz*, but have not as yet had Audience of the King; it is hoped they come to pro-pose a Treaty for the mutual defence of both Crowns against the Turks.

Seville, Sept. 3. The Spanish Armada are return-ed into the Bay of *Cadix*, the Vice-Admirals Ship being so leaky that they had much adoe to keep her above water: They intend very suddainly to go to sea
