Berlin, November 3.

THE Prince Royal is at Wusterhausen, where St. Hubert's Feast was celebrated this Day. The Duke of Bevern arrived there Yesterday, and his Highness will set out on the 6th Instant for Vienna. Count Degenfelt set out the 31st past for London. The King is to go to Potsdam the 10th Instant, where the Prince of Anhalt is expected, his Highness being to accompany his Majesty into Pomerania.

Brussels, N v. 6. The 4th Instant, the Festival of St. Charles Borromeo, being the Emperour's Name-Day, was celebrated here with the usual Ceremonies. The Archduchess received on that Occasion the Compliments of the Prince of Nassau Orange, the Hereditary Prince of Bevern, Prince Esterhafi, and of the Lords and Ladies of the Court. The Prince of Nassau Orange is upon his Return for Holland.

Hague, Nov. 11. The greatest Part of the Members of the States of Holland are already arrived here to be at the Opening of their Assembly To-morrow. M. Imberti, who is going with the Character of Minister to the Court of Great Britain from the Republick of Venice, arrived here Yesterday, and is gone to Rotterdam to embark there for London. A Letter written to the States by the Prince of Ziegen, who is in Spain, against the Delivery of the Effects of the late King William to the Prince of Nassau Orange, which M. Vander Meer had refused to send on Account of some want of Formalities, being come hither by the Post without any Alteration, has been sent back unopened the same Way. Yesterday Morning a Letter was delivered to the States from the Prince of Ziegen of the Protestant Line, protesting against the said Delivery, in Failure of the said Prince of Ziegen, who is in Spain; which was received and read. This Day we have received Advice, that Victor Amadeus, late King of Sardinia, died the 31st of last Month.

This Day the Chevalier Offorio, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sardinia, had a private Audience of His Majesty, to notify the Death of the late King his Father Victor Amadeus; to which he was introduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

He had afterwards a private Audience of Her Majesty; to which he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Grantham Her Majesty's Lord Chamberlain.
