*Vienna, November 1. N. S.*

**O**N Tuesday Morning the young Prince Eugene of Savoy, came back to this Place from the Academy of Turin, where he has finished his Studies, and lately from Massa Carara, where he visited the Princess of that Name, to whom he is promised: He was met at some distance from this Town by the Princess his Mother, with whom he went directly to Prince Eugene his Grand Uncle, who in the Evening introduced him to their Imperial Majesties, by whom he was very graciously received. On Wednesday Morning their Imperial Majesties took the Diversion of Hunting in this Neighbourhood. On Thursday the Emperor held a Council of State, and gave Audiences to several Ministers. Yesterday their Imperial Majesties took again the Diversion of Hunting at a Place called Brigita, dined there, and in the Evening assisted at Vespers. There is Advice that Count Locatelli, Colonel of a Regiment of Horse and Commander of Esleck, died there the 24th past.

*Berlin, Nov. 8, N. S.* On Sunday Evening last the Duke of Bevern came to Wusterhausen, from whence, after two Days Stay he proceeded on his Journey for Vienna. Last Monday being the Festival of St. Hubert, it was celebrated at Wusterhausen in the usual Manner, and two Days afterwards the Court removed from thence, viz. the King to Potzdam, and the Queen to the Palace in this Town. His Prussian Majesty will also be here in eight or ten Days, in order to assist at the Nuptials of a Daughter of General Borck's, with M. Borck, President of the Regency of Minden, a near Relation of the General's. M. Borck, another Relation of the said General's, Minister from the King of Prussia to the Duke of Brunswick, arrived here two Days ago from Wolfenbuttel, and he is forthwith to go to Dresden, to compliment the King of Poland on the Part of his Prussian Majesty, on his safe Arrival in his Electoral Dominions. His Prussian Majesty intends to set out on the 22d or 23d Instant for Pomerania, to take there the Diversion of Boar Hunting. The Prince Royal has been

for a few Days at Wusterhausen, and accompanied the King his Father from thence to Potzdam.

*Hague, Nov. 14, N. S.* The States of Holland are still sitting, and have this Day disposed of all the Places Civil and Military vacant at their Disposal. Their Design was to continue their Assembly for settling other Affairs, but the Pensionary being again very ill of the Gout, it is thought they will separate To-morrow for a little while. The King of Prussia's Minister here is ordered to act jointly with the Prince of Nassau Orange, for obtaining the Delivery of the Effects of the late King William's Succession. The Count de Chiusan, Minister from the King of Sardinia, has delivered a Letter to the States, notifying the Death of the King his Father. We have this Day received Advices from Spain, that the Moors had been defeated before Ceuta by the Garrison of that Place, who having unexpectedly made a Sally, killed 3000 of the Besiegers, and made themselves Masters of their Camp.
