*Turin, November 5, N. S.*

**T**HIS Morning the Body of King Victor Amadeus was carried from Montcallier to the Supergue, a Church two Miles from this City on the Top of a Hill, appropriated for the Burial of the Sovereigns of this Country. As the Proceſſion paſſed under the Ramparts in their Way to this Church, the Guns of the Town and Citadel were fired. The Body was attended by the Great Chamberlain, the Great Maſter of the Horſe, a Captain of the Horſe Guard, with a Lieutenant and 70 Men. The Body had lain in State for four Days at Montcallier, dressed out in the Royal Robes and the Habit of the Order of the Annonciada. There was a great Concourse of People. His Sardinian Maſteſty is retired to the Venerie, and has received there the usual Compliments of Condolence on this Occaſion, and will not return hither till about the 18th Inſtant.

*Vienna, Nov. 8.* The Emperour is perfectly recovered of his late Cold, and frequently holds Cabinet Councils. To-morrow Evening the new Opera will be performed, which was to have been done on the Emperour's Name Day; but the great Firework is not to be played off till the 15th, being the Festival of St. Leopold, when their Imperial Maſteſties will return to this City from the Monastery of Neuberg, or the 19th Inſtant, which is the Name-Day of the Empreſs. Yeſterday a Privy Council was held at Court upon the Affairs of Bohemia. The Duke of Lorraine will ſtay here till after the Celebration of the Empreſs's Name-Day.

*Berlin, Nov. 15.* General Borck, and General Count Levenwolde Miniſter from Ruſſia, have been theſe two Days at Potzdam, where his Maſteſty has had two private Conferences with them. The King is expected here next Sunday. The Privy Councellor M. de Borck is gone to Dresden, with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary to the King of Poland.

*Hague, Nov. 21, N. S.* The Prince of Naſſau Orange, who was expected here from Bruſſels on Saturday next, arrived here unexpectedly the 19th in the Evening. After having been to viſit the Presidents of the ſeveral Colleges of the State, he received their Compliments Yeſterday and this Day upon his Arrival, as alſo thoſe of the Foreign Miniſters and other Perſons of Diſtinction. He will remain here till the Beginning of the enſuing Year, on Account of the Affairs which relate to the Diſtribution of the Effects of the late King William. The Grand Penſionary is now in a pretty good State of Health, and it is hoped that he will be able to aſſiſt at the Aſſembly of the States of Holland on Wednesday next. The Com-

miſſioners of the Admiralty are ſtill here. The Directors of the Eaſt India Company are gone home, having given their Sentiments upon certain Affairs which concern their Trade. The Sieur Pallavicini, who was Secretary to M. Hop at Paris, is nominated to be Conſul of Holland at Algiers.
