Vienna, November 29, N. S.

ON Wednesday last in the Morning the Emperour held a Cabinet Council, and in the Afternoon gave Audience to several Persons. The next Day his Imperial Majesty took the Diversion of Hunting in the Neighbourhood of Lintz, and dined there in a Tent. The same Day Sig. Fofcarini, the new Ambassadour from the Republick of Venice, arrived here, to succeed Sig. Bragadini; who will set out in a few Days on his Return to Venice. For these 15 Days past a Sort of an Epidemical Distemper has raged here, which generally seizes People with a violent Cold, attended with the Head-Ach and Fever. Several Persons have died of it. The Emperour was very much indisposed with it, but at present her Imperial Majesty is entirely recovered. The Duke of Lorrain set out from hence this Day on his Return to Presbourg.

Vienna, Dec. 3, N. S. General Count Vehlen is appointed Commander in Chief of the Imperial Troops in the Austrian Low Countries, in the Room of the late General Count Zumjungen. His Government of Ath is given to Count Philippi, Colonel Commandant of the Prince of Bevern's Regiment of Dragoons, and it is thought that the Count d'Aspremont de Linden will succeed Count Philippi. The Emperour has not yet filled up the vacant Government of Esleck. The Ceremony of the Infallment of the young Prince Eugene of Savoy, and of Count Schonborn, as Knights of the Order of the Golden Fleece, is fixed to the 7th Instant. The Marquess de Prie, and the Count de Ostein, are arrived here.

Cologn, Dec. 12. The Elector of Bavaria is expected in a short Time at Bonn from Munich, to visit his Brother the Elector of Cologn. They write from Manheim, that the Count de Polheim, first Minister of the Bishop of Ausbourg, arrived there the 7th Instant from Dusseldorp, and that he had made a Report to the Elector Palatine of all that had passed on Occasion of the Homage which he received from the States of Bergue and Juliers, in the Name of the Bishop his Master.
