Copenhagen, December 6, N. S.

A Frigate of Fifty Guns, called the Oldenbourg, was launched here a few Days ago. This is the Seventh new built Ship, and the smallest, that has been launched since the present King came to the Crown. They are now preparing the Stocks for one of 90 Guns; which, with another of a lesser Rate, they propose to finish before the End of next Year.

Hague, Dec. 12, N. S. The Deputation expected from Zealand upon the Account of Ter Veer and Vlesingue, has been retarded, and there is no Communication made yet to the States General of the Province of Zealand's Resolution. M. Masch, the Prussian Envoy, has presented a Memorial to the States, as Executor of the late King William's Inheritance, to have the Papers delivered to him concerning the Seigneurie of Herstal, whose supreme Dominion is claimed by the Governess of the Austrian Netherlands, and by the Bishop of Liege. The Council of the Domaines is ordered to give him authentick Copies of them, but not the Originals. The State of War for the ensuing Year, which was presented to the States General by the Council of State, has been sent to the respective Provinces; as likewise the Resolution of the States of Holland for the Reduction of the Troops.

Hague, Dec. 16, N. S. As the States of Guelderland had protested some Time ago against the Design of making a Reduction of the Forces, when the States of Holland's Resolution was communicated to the Assem-

bly of the States General, their Deputies declared, that they insisted upon the Necessity of keeping the Army upon the same Foot it is at present. Overysiel declared the same.
