Berlin, December 16, N. S.

IT is confidently reported, that a Treaty of Marriage is on Foot between Prince Anthony Ulrich of Bevern, and the Princess of Mecklenbourg. That young Prince is to go to Petersbourg very soon, and on his Arrival there, will have the Command of a Regiment conferred upon him. M. Levenwolde set out this Morning on his Return to Petersbourg. The King of Prussia went this Morning to Potzdam.

Hague, Dec. 23, N. S. The Baron de Wachtendonck, who is appointed Envoy Extraordinary by the Elector Palatine to the Court of Great Britain, is expected here daily, being arrived at Dusseldorp in his Way to this Place, according to the Advices received by the last Post. A Letter from the King of Prussia was delivered to the States this Morning, pressing for the Delivery of the Effects of the late King William, and complaining that there was no Answer made to his former Letter notifying his Agreement with the Prince of Orange. The Prince of Siegen having authorized by his Credentials to the States an Advocate of this Place, they have accepted the Prince's Letter and his Protest against the Delivery of the above-mentioned Effects required by the Prince of Orange Nassau. The States having desired of the Elector of Bavaria a free Passage for 400 Families, making the Number of 1500 Souls, designed to be settled in

Zealand, M. Ganfinot, his Minister, delivered Yesterday to the States the Elector's Passport for them. Copies of the Papers demanded in the Name of the King of Prussia, concerning the Seigneurie of Herstal, have been delivered to M. Masch, the Prussian Envoy, who says it will be proved, that Herstal is neither under the Dependance of Brabant, nor the Prince of Liege, but of the Empire alone.
