Dresden, December 27, N. S.

WE have Accounts from Poland, that there has been great strugling at Cracow about the Electing of Deputies for the approaching Diet: The Party against the Court had a Mind to prevent M. Ozarowsky's being chosen there, as before, (because being the first Palatinat, it gives Title to the Function of Marshal of the Diet till one is elected) which they were likely to succeed in; therefore Means were found to break up the Diet, without electing any Person; and M. Ozarowsky is since chosen at Zator, which gives him the same Rank, as if he had been for Cracow, that Dietine not subsisting.

Copenhagen, Dec. 27, N. S. The Court has been some Time at Friedericksberg, notwithstanding the Rigour of the Winter, which is extraordinarily severe. Major General Pretorius, the late Governour of Cronenburgh, being dead, that Post is now given to Major General Reventfeldt, who was Secretary at War in the last Reign.

Hambourg, Dec. 30, N. S. The Dutch-ess of Bevern set out from hence last Saturday Morning, with the Princess her Daughter, and went directly to Arensboek to the Dutch-ess Dowager of Holstein-Ploen; but Prince Anthony Ulrich, her Son, accompanied by M. Knysted and Major Heimburch proceeded on his Journey to Schwerin by the Way of

Lubeck, where he arrived on Sunday Morning, and that Evening at Wismar, where he lay that Night, and it is thought that he arrived Yesterday at Schwerin. It is generally believed that his Highness will stay two or three Days with Duke Charles Leopold of Mecklenbourg at Schwerin, and then proceed on his Journey to Petersbourg. It is reported, that the Czarina has promised this Prince a Pension of 6000 Rubels a Year, and a Regiment, until he marries the Princess of Mecklenbourg.
