HIS Court has received Advice from M. Levashew, their General in Persia, that he had been informed by one of his Spies, that Tachmach Culicam, the Sophy's General and Brother-in-Law, had been at Ispahan, where he had found Schach Tamach the Sophy leading a very voluptuous and idle Life, being entirely given up to his Pleasures. He took the Liberty to reproach him with it, faying that his Conduct was unworthy a Sovereign. This anger'd the Sophy very much, who told Tachmach Culicam, that he should lose his Head for speaking to him in that Manner: Upon which Tachmach Culicam, who is Master of the Army, secured the Sophy's Person, and has since sent him as a Prisoner to Mischet. After which he placed the Crown, as an Ensign of Royalty upon the Cradle of the Sophy's Son, who is an Infant of four Months old, and a Sabre at the Feet of the Cradle, and has taken the Jesty's Chaplains in Ordinary, to be Bishop Child with him to Casbin, where he deligns of that See, void by the Death of Dr. Wilto relide.

Petersbourg, Dec. 9, O. S. in their Nature inseparable, and but one and the same thing; and they declare themselves determined to perfift in their first Resolution. This Matter has been debated in the Assembly of the States General, the Provinces difagreeing about it: Guelderland, Friseland, and Groninghen, have protested in Form against the Proceeding of Zealand: And there the Affair rests at present. Baron Wachtendonck is expected here by Monday next, in order to imbark for England.
