**B**Y Order of the Court, Preparations are making for sending under a Convooy Stores of all Sorts of Ammunition to Pultowa, from whence they are to be sent to the Magazines in the Ukraine. Several Sledges are lately come hither loaded with Iron and Brass taken out of the Mines in Siberia. The Merchants who trade into Persia, are about to send thither great Quantities of Merchandize, upon Advice that they have received from Derbent, that Kouli Kan, Generalissimo of the Troops in Persia, had sent Orders to the Sea Ports of that Kingdom that are situate upon the Caspian Sea, to admit the Russian Ships in the same Manner they were received in the Reign of Scach Thamas; and to levy the Duty of the Goods on board upon a moderate Foot, conformably to the late Treaty.

*Berlin, Jan. 24, N. S.* The King of Prussia went to Potzdam last Saturday, as the Queen, the Margrave and Margravine of Bareith, and the Princess Charlotte did Yesterday. The Duke of Bevern and the Hereditary Prince his Son are expected there on the 1st of next Month. M. Johnn, the Danish Resident, has received his Letters of Revocation, and it is said here, he is to be succeeded by General Pretorius, who is to have the Character of Envoy Extraordinary; and that

Count Wartenleben, youngest Son of the Felt-Marshal of that Name, is actually appointed his Prussian Majesty's Minister at the Court of Denmark.

*Hague, Jan. 30, N. S.* The States had an Account the 28th Instant by an Express, that their General Count Hompesch died suddenly last Sunday at a Country Seat in the Dutchy of Juliers, whither he was gone to be at the Burial of his Brother, a Major-General in this Service, who died some Days before. By the Death of the General, the Government of Boileduc is become vacant, as also the Command of the Regiment of Life-Guards, besides his Post of General of Horse. The Government of Boileduc was this Day given by the States General to M. de Friesheim, General of the Foot. The States had Advice likewise Yesterday of the Death of Lieutenant General Baron Huffell, and Brigadier General Maleprade; and by these several Deaths there are three Regiments vacant, besides the Scotch Regiment of Cunningham, who died lately. Three of them, viz. the Life-Guards, Huffell, and Cunningham, are upon the Repartition of Holland, and Maleprade upon that of Utrecht. The Prince of Orange talks of setting out next Week for Friesland. According to Advices, the Elector of Bavaria returned to Manheim the 25th Instant, and was to stay there till the 28th, when he designed to depart on his Return to Munich.
