**T**HE States of the Province of Holland met to Day, and have under Consideration the Prince of Nassau Orange's Demand of having the Effects of the late King William that fall to his Share delivered to him; Which Affair, it is believed, they will bring to a Conclusion before they break up.

Dublin, January 22.

Saturday last being the Birth-Day of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the great Guns were fired at the Barracks, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison which were drawn out upon Ox-mantown Green. At Noon the Lords Justices met at the Castle, and received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction upon this Occasion; and afterwards made a Tour upon the Strand, attended by the Battle-Axe-Guards and a Squadron of Dragoons. And at Night there was a Play given by their Excellencies for the Entertainment of the Ladies.
