Petersbourg, February 3, O. S.

THE 28th of last Month being the Anniversary of her Czarish Majesty's Birth-day, there was at Court in the Morning a great Appearance of the Russian Nobility and Persons of Distinction. In the Evening there was a Ball, and a very fine Illumination and Firework upon the River. An Express arrived here Yesterday from Warsaw, with Advice of the Death of the King of Poland. The Prince of Bevern is expected here to Day.

Copenhagen, Feb. 28, N. S. It is said here, that the King fully intends to take a Journey this Summer, but whether it will be to Norway, or into Holstein, or to Aix, for the Recovery of the Queen's Health, is as yet very uncertain.

Hague, March 6, N. S. The French Ambassadour, and the Envoys of the Emperour and King of Great Britain, have this Morning separately had Conferences with the Deputies of the States, on Account of the Answer given to a Memorial of M. Ginkel from the King of Prussia, which was brought hither by Express the 4th Instant in the Evening, and has been communicated to those three Ministers. The Assembly of the States of Holland continues fixed for the 12th Instant. The Commissioners ordered to examine the Additions and Corrections desired by the Prince of Orange to be inserted in the Resolution of the States concerning the Delivery of his Part of the Effects of the late King William, made their Report Yesterday, and were of Opinion they may be accepted, and it is thought the Province of Holland, and the other three which have taken the Matter *ad referendum*, will not be against it. Count Chiufano, Minister from the King of Sardinia, having obtained Leave to return home, on Account of his ill State of Health, is to take his Leave To-morrow of the States by a Memorial.

Thursday last being the Anniversary of Her Majesty's Birth-day, Her Majesty received at Noon the Compliments of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes. At Night there was a Ball. The Appearance was at both Times very numerous, and extremely splendid. On this Occasion the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired; and in the Evening there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other publick Demonstrations of Joy throughout London and Westminster.

Whereas on the 4th Day of February last, Three Women were most barbarously murdered in a Chamber in the Inner Temple, and Sarah Malcomb stands convicted for the Murder of one of the said Women; and whereas there is great reason to suspect that others were concerned in the Murders aforesaid: His Majesty for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in so barbarous and heinous a Crime, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one or more of them (except the said Sarah Malcomb) who

shall discover his, her or their Accomplices or Accomplices, so as he, she or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a further Encouragement the Two Societies of the Temple do hereby promise, that in case any Person or Persons shall discover any other, besides the said Sarah Malcomb, concerned in the said Murders, or any of them, so as he, she or they shall be convicted thereof, the Person or Persons making such Discovery, shall receive as a Reward for each Person so convicted the Sum of One Hundred Pounds, to be paid by the Under Treasurers of the said Societies.

Whereas Rogers Holland, of Chippenham, in the County of Wilts, Esq; having in the Month of September last, with the Assistance of his Neighbours and Servants, seized and committed to Salisbury Goal, Three Persons, who with several others supposed to belong to the Coal Works in the Forest of Kingwood in the County of Gloucester, were in a riotous Manner pulling down and destroying the Turnpikes erected by Act of Parliament on the Road near Chippenham aforesaid; an Anonymous Letter was on the 7th Day of February Instant, sent to Mr. John Stock his Tenant, to be communicated to him the said Mr. Holland, threatening the firing by Night, or pulling down of his House, and Mischief to his Person, in Case he do prosecute the Persons imprisoned as above-mentioned for the said Offence: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in the heinous Crime of sending the said anonymous threatening Letter, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them who shall discover his Accomplices or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is also pleased to promise a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any one of them, or to any other Person or Persons who shall make such Discovery as aforesaid, to be paid on the Conviction of the Offender or Offenders.

The Commissioners for managing his Majesty's Stamp Revenues, do hereby give Notice, That by a Clause in an Act of this Session of Parliament, intituled, an Act for continuing the Duties upon Malt, Ale, Mum, Cyder and Perry, in that Part of Great Britain call'd England; and for granting to his Majesty certain Duties upon Malt, Mum, Cyder, and Perry, in that Part of Great Britain, call'd Scotland, for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and thirty three, and for giving further Time to Clerks and Apprentices to pay Duties omitted to be paid for their Indentures and Contracts: It is (inter alia) enacted as followeth, That for the Relief of any Person or Persons, who through Neglect or Inadvertency have omitted to pay the several Rates and Duties, or any Part thereof, upon Moneys given, paid, contracted or agreed for, with or in relation to any Clerk, Apprentice, or Servant, which hath been put or placed to or with any Master or Mistress, to learn any Profession, Trade or Employment, and to have such Indentures or other Writings which shall contain the Covenants, Articles, Contracts, or Agreements, relating to the Service of such Clerk, Apprentice or Servant, stamped within the Times by the several Acts of Parliament for these Purposes respectively limited, or who have also in like manner omitted to insert and write in Words at length in such Indentures or other Writings, as aforesaid, the full Sum or Sums of Money, or any Part thereof received, or is any wise directly or indirectly given, paid, agreed, contracted for, with or in relation to every such Clerk, Apprentice, or Servant, as aforesaid; be it e
