Warsaw, March 28, N. S.

AT all the Dietines that we have yet an Account of, Instructions are given to the Deputies to declare at the Diet of Convocation, that their Palatines will never suffer the Election of a Foreigner for their King; and at some it is added, even though a Foreigner should have been naturalized. At the Dietine of Oputow in the Palatinate of Sendomir, there has been a great Tumult, and 15 or 16 Persons killed. It began by the Palatine's Guard (which were posted in the Town to keep the Peace) taking the Part of the Jews, who were ill treated by the Mob: The Guard not being strong enough, retreated to the Palatine's House, where they were followed, and obliged to defend themselves. It happened in the Evening, so the Night coming on ended the Matter. The Palatine himself endeavouring to pacify them narrowly escaped being murdered. Means were found to prevent further Mischief the next Day. M. Levold, the Russian Minister, has lately received a Letter from his Court, which gives a very different Account from that of the Turkish Envoy's relating to those Parts, for it says that the Turks have been entirely beaten by the Persians.

Berlin, April 4, N. S. Orders have been repeated and renewed to all the Regiments

on the Frontiers of Poland, to be in a Readiness to take the Field in Eight Days Time, Orders have actually been sent for the Release of the Dutch Soldiers.

Hague, April 10, N. S. The States of Holland have consented to the keeping up of the same Number of Troops which are now on foot, till the latter End of June next, and it is thought that the intended Reduction will be put off from Time to Time so as to defeat that Project of reducing them.
