Petersbourg, March 25, O. S.

General Count Levenvolde set out Yesterday upon his Embassy to Poland. He has Orders to make all possible Diligence. The Squadron which is fitting out in this Harbour and at Cronslot, is to be ready to set Sail at the Close of this Month. Preparations are making for a grand Hunting for the Diversion of Prince Anthony Ulrich of Bevern : It is said her Czarish Majesty will be present at it and her whole Court. Upon Advice that an Ottoman Ambassadour will arrive soon on the Frontiers, Orders have been sent to the commanding Officer at Pultowa to guard him with a Detachment of 50 Cossacks, and to defray his Expences hither.

Copenhagen, April 7, N. S. M. de Pless, Gentleman of the Bedchamber to the Elector of Saxony, and his Envoy Extraordinary to this Court, arrived Yesterday in this City. To-morrow he sets out for Fridericksbourg, in order to notify to their Danish Majesties the Death of the late King of Poland.

Hague, Aug. 17, N. S. An Assembly of the States of Holland is summoned to meet next Wednesday Seven-night. The three Provinces of which the Prince of Orange is Stadholder, proposed Yesterday by their Deputies in the Assembly of the States General, that the Effects of the late King William which are allotted to that Prince,

should be delivered to him, the States of Utrecht and Overyssel having consented thereto. To this Proposition the Deputies of Holland said, that the States of their Province would give their Answer in their next Assembly. The Dutch Soldiers that were made Prisoners by the King of Prussia's Command, are not yet released ; though it is confirmed from Berlin, that Orders have been certainly issued for that Purpose. The Prince of Holstein-Beck and General Colyars are Competitors for the Command of the Regiment of Foot Guards which became void by the Death of General Freisheim ; which Command is to be disposed of by the States of Holland during their next Session.
