THE States of Holland are to assemble To-morrow, and it is thought that something will be determined in the Affair of the Prince of Orange. His Highness having been invited last Saturday to dine on board of a Yacht of the Admiralty of Rotterdam, he was followed by a vast Number of People while he was there, who cry'd out, Long live the Prince of Orange. The English Ships in the Maelf expressed their Satisfaction to see the Prince, by hoisting their Colours and firing their Guns all the Time he was at Dinner, and at his Landing. M. van Hoey, who had obtained Leave to come hither to settle his private Affairs, having received Orders to return to his Post, set out for Paris last Sunday. The Differences arisen on Occasion of the States having appointed a Protestant to be a Counsellor of the Court of Justice at Venlo, have been accommodated with the Count de Sinzendorff to the Satisfaction of both Parties. A Placard has lately been published, forbidding on Pain of Banishment, the selling of a Book which revives the Sentiments of Spinoza.
