Pembrook, July 13.

Nothe 11 infrant passes by this Harbor the Virginia Fleet from Ireland, bound for Bristol, whose first appearance caused some allarum in these parts, till a surther discovery gave them satisfaction.

Sunderland, July 14. This night we have discovered a Caper of greater force then that lately taken, who is now plying in the Offige of the River Teas, of which we have sent to inform the Pembrook and Fountain before Tynmouth, who we have may in due time give a good account of him.

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Southworld, July 16. The Dutch continue crufing in small parties upon these Coasts; this morning we discovered seven, whereof four great ships, who sirst stood inwards, but after went off Southwards; five of our Vessells laden with Merchants goods, arrived the tenth at Tarmouth, only one shallop appeared in their way, who durst not venture on then, having a Figure Convoy.

Pendennis, July 16. On Saturday last Capt. Luke Hall, in the Lord of Joundels Fregat brought into this Harbor a prize of new 200 Tuns, and fix guns, ten Men and a Boy, and some Fielocks: She has the common pretence of an Oslender, and is laden with Wine and Brandy, with good flore of Paper.

Nexcessel, July 17. We have this farther account of the Dutch Coper of 22 Guns, called the Flying Grey-hound, taken the last week by the Pembrock, that she had not been a week at Sea before she was won from them, and in her six months Provision, sixty four Prisoners, besides thirteen Men killed 3 the Capt. Lieutenant, and Matter one Ramsey a scorehman, with the Chyrurgian and Chaplain pur on board the Pombrook, the rest delivered to the Mayor prisoners, who consess they had no heart to fight after they had discovered the Red-Coats, whose service in this action was generally commenced.

Weymenth, July 18. On Tuescay x7. The tide between six in the moining, and twelve at noon, was by a very museall and drange accident observed to flow six times, and ebbe as esten; it coming on with that sorce, as to beat over the Bowes and sides of several ships that lay at Anchor in the Harbor; and in less then a quatter of an house did fall five soot perpendicular, which much is sed the Admiration of the people upon those Chasts, having never seen it in that irregular motion before.

Normich, July 18. The Account of our Bill for this lake week runs thus. Buried in all 85, whereof of the Plague 69. Besides at the Pestinouse 20, and at Brakindale 2.

West-Cowes, July 18. On the sixteenth instant, the Deptford Ketch, Cap. Marke Pierce Commander, brought in hither a great ship laden with 250 Way of French Salt from Brouage in France, with some Muscowado Sugars taken in at St. Martins, show whence he let iail the seventh instant, old stile, and less there about 15 or 16 Hollanders and swedes lading Salt and other Commodities, most of them bound for the North passage; and says, That about forty French Visiels are lading for the Grunde Partie to come cut with all Expedition, under the Convoy of foar Men of Wat. This morning arrived the Paradox Fregat, who brought in 3. Vessels, supposed Prize.

Dever, July 18. This morning at seven-come in the French Pacquet telling us. That two small Shallops from Calling us.

to the Dutch Fleet full of C valiers and their Servants. Cape Lucy hath fent in hither a French prize which heto k off Bologne, which was in company of a Pickaroon, who fought him four hours, with defign to have referred her; but was fired at the last to leave the prize behinde him. This day he fent in another small Frenchman of 40 or 50 Tuns with Wine and Brandy, who pleads a Protection.

Whitchal, July 21. He Right Honorable the Lord Arlington, His Majesties Prinsipal Sceretary of State, having on Wednesday last made his complaint to His Majesty in Council, that one Mr. Edmond Warcup, Juffice of the Perce for the County of Middlesex, had greatly wronged him in his good Name, fally using his Name, in Treating and Negotiative with certain persons for the quitting and indemnifying (in confideration of a sum of money) one of the persons lately summoned by it Ma effics Proclamation to repair from berond the Seas: Which Treaty having for several moneths been carried on, and managed by the siid Mr. Warcup, he had all along falfly mide "fe of the Lord A-lington's name therein. as privy and confenting to the transaction : Wiere pon His Majesty having caused the whole matter to be duly examined by certain of the Lords of His Conneil, and their Lordships having made Report yesterday to His Majesty as the Board, that the matter was false and scandalous; It was ordered by His Maje ty in Council, that in vin lication of the Lord Arlington, and far an example of fuch urjust and pernicious afferfions brought upon his Ministers and Government, the faid Mr. Warcup sould be forthwith committed to the Fleet, put out of Commission of the Peace and I is usenancy, and remain for ever banish the Court; His Royal Highness hiving at the same time declared he would likewise difnis him his service. The Lord Arlington being left to take his firther remedy against him at Law, as his Lor thip shall think good.

Rome, July 10. The Pope for some daies hath kept his Bed, which makes the Men of saction here look about them. Dom Pedra d' Arragon the Vice Roy of Naples, hath been ill too, but is pretty well recovered. The Prince of Palestina Nephew to the 2 Cardinals Barbarini, hath a third Sonn to the great joy of that House. This afternoon the D. de Chaulnes hath made his Solemn Entry at the Porto del Popolo, in the Cardinal Chizi's Coach, attended with a Train of 80 others, among which were the Cardinals Antonio, de Retz, Ursino, Maidalchino, and Mancizi.

Hague, July 23. We were much startled here, to finde by de Ruyters Letter of the 20, that the English were so near coming out, and in so much greater strength then we were hitherto made believe they could make up; to wit, 95 Men of War, and upwards of 20 Fireships, while, as he in that Detter reckons them, his confitts but of 86 Man of War, and 10 Fireships, including therein Swaerts his ship, with the three other from the Texel, and the two from Goree. So as now all hands are at work to fit out immediately 20 mole fighting amps for reinforcing his strength: orders are disputcht to their several Admiralties to take their number whereever they can first finde them; the most part, it is believe, will be lad out of the 24 new ships fet on work lest Winter, from 60 to 70 Guns, of which, fix are at Amjiord n, and two at Rotterdam, all having their Masts up, and most of their Ricging. Zealand are fix, and in Frise and North-Holland 10, which are forwarded with all inaustry, besides the 10 building for the French King; but those are in no likelihood to do us any good in this conjuncture.

After all we finde what a bargain we are like to have of the Exench Alliance, still excuses are made for Beauforts non-

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appearance, and in recompence of that failor, the French King hath offered by the Marshal d'Aymonie, Governor of Balogne, 2000 Land-men to pass on Board de Ruyter, which he refuled to accept of, having already on board him, more of our own men then were useful to him.

Orders are issued to de Ruster to take all Newters ships carrying Counterband Goods, be they bound whither they will. In consequence of which, he hath sent up two Swedish

Fluits laden with Pitch, Tar, Lon, &c.

On Monday Collonel Jeersom arrived at the Brielle, with 1000 of those land Men which had been out with the Fleet, he himself giving the Deputies for Sea affairs this account, that they had endeavored to have landed about Margase, but found the Coafts fo well guarded, that no defign of that nature could safely be put in practise, so that de Ruyter had agein returned shem to their Garrisons, referving only 400 pickt men, whom he employes in his Fleet to supply the defect of Scamen.

At Rozzerdam there are four Firefnips hastning out, that were new F ega s from 28 to 36 guns, formerly Convoyers to the Herring Buffes, befides thefe, feweral little Veffels which are fent from the Texell with provisions are said to be by de Ruyter converted into Fireships, in whom we place

much confidence.

On the 23 instant, the Swedish Minister gave in his Credentialis, and Propositions for a Mediation, desiring their foredy answer in writing, and offering conference upon the businels, and tis said proposes a Cessation of armes dureing the Treaty. The States hav taken time for the return of their aniw r, preten ing first to found the Intentions of the French King on the King of Lenmark, and to that end have ordered a conference with their Ministers here. But the truth is, there feems to be, withflanding all the vain boafting and appearance of our present expedition to les, a secret difposition to an Accommo ation even in the most interessed among us, could it be differe ly brought about. what we are to trust to in our Alliances, and besides all the other cheats put upon us, it appears now we deceive our selves 200. Helland is now deliberating upon the point; and its likely their opinion will be followed by the other Provinces, and it may be even without confulting France before hand, only in good manners the resolution will be communicated to them when taken.

Denmark would fain perfect the close Allience herctosore proposed, and polongue the Treaty with Lunenburgh; but thats sca ce probabe, while that Dukes forces continue, whether we will or no in Friefland. The Sieur Haygens and the rest that are gone into Flanders, have orders not to see the Muquels Castel de Rodrigo, he having not given that satisfaction that was expected in the matter of our Resident.

Upon further debate of the ways to make ready a good reserve for our Fleet, as no stone now is lest unturned to effect it, its found, that in Read of new Contributions, several Provinces are strangely in arrear of the old, Geldre especially, and Overyssel, and Zealand too, is very backward. So as it is proposed, that the le Provinces be taxed the two hundreth penny, as the sest have been ; but they absolutely refuse. And in all these cases, the credit of Holland must be made use of, to make up what is wanting, so as that Province hath been found to put off the intended Payment of the Land Army for ome time.

Hamburgh, July 14. Whitehal, July 22. Thursday morning about fix a Cicck, the wind at S. W. our whole Fleet weighed from the Buoy in the Nore, and fell down that Tide to the Middle-grounds, and Anchore, about two Miles below the Shooe : But the 20th, the wind coming about to N. W. confidering the shallow water there, and that the Generals are deficous to pals them all out at one Tide, they are forced to stay till they may have Gale enough to Stem the Tile of Flood, which they extreamly long for ; all men expressing infinite impatience to engage the Enemy, who feem now reti ed further in to Sea, and to lie more close than ordinarily in the fi ure of a Half-moon, having called in their Van that lay in the Gun-fleet.
