THE Grand Pensionary being taken ill on Friday last with a Fit of the Gout, the States of Holland adjourned till To-morrow Seven-night. The Baron de Boetselaer, Major of the Horse Guards, died some Days ago of the Small Pox; besides his Commission of Major and his Troop, there is a Civil Employment vacant, called the Heemraed or Inspector of the Diques; for which Employment there are a great many Competitors. M. de Gallieres, Minister of the States at Ratisbon, is arrived, having obtained Leave to come hither on his private Affairs.

Dublin-Castle, May 25.

His Majesty having been pleased to order a new Commission to pass the Seals, constituting the Lord Primate and the Lord Chancellor Lords Justices of this Kingdom, and empowering any one of them to act in case of the Death of the other, or in his Absence, occasioned by Sickness or other necessary Cause; this Day their Excellencies were accordingly sworn Lords Justices in Council, in the usual Manner.

At a Meeting of the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners appointed by His Majesty's Letter Patent to take a Survey of the Officers of the Courts of Justice in England and Wales, and to enquire into their Fees.

Ordered, That all Persons claiming to be Officers, Clerks or Ministers of or within the Ecclesiastical Courts of the Diocesses of Bath and Wells and Carlisle, and of the Archdeacons of Lincoln and Northampton, and all other Courts Ecclesiastical and Civil in England and Wales and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, who have not yet given in their Lists of Fees, pursuant to their Lordships former Orders, do forthwith lay before their Lordships (by leaving the same in Writing, signed by the several and respective Officers, with Mr. Joshua Sharpe, the Secretary to this Commission, at his Chambers, No. 6, in Pump Court in the Temple) an Account of the Nature of their respective Offices, and what Service, Charge and Attendance doth belong unto each of them by Virtue of their respective Offices, and what Fees, Rewards and Wages every of the said Officers, Clerks and Ministers, and their Substitutes or Under-Clerks, have and take for and in Respect of their several Offices and Places.
