St. James's, June 12.

THE Sovereign having determined to hold a Chapter of the most Noble Order of the Garter, and the Knights Companions resident in and near London being summoned to attend here this Day, there appeared habited in their Mantles the Knights hereit after mentioned, with the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Winchester Prelate of the Order, the Lord Bishop of Salisbury Chancellor, Garter King of Arms, and the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, in their respective Mantles, and wearing their different Badges, who all waited the Sovereign's coming; and upon his Appearance, Garter by the Sovereign's Command called over the Names of the Knights Companions present, beginning with those in the lowest Stalls, according to the Dispositions of them in the Chapel at Windsor, who thereon proceeded from the Apartment next to his Majesty's Closet, to the Council-Chamber (where the Chapter was held) in the following Method, where the Juniors went first, and the Knights whose Companions in the Stalls opposite to them were absent went single.

Upon entering the Council Chamber, the Knights stood behind their several Chairs (placed there as at the Time of holding the Privy Council) till the Sovereign had seated himself in the Chair of State at the upper End of the Table, and then by his Majesty's Leave took their Chairs, the Prelate and Chancellor standing near his Majesty's Chair, and the two other Officers at the lower End of the Table. Then the Chancellor by the Sovereign's Command declared his Royal Pleasure, that one of the vacant Stalls at Windsor should be filled: Whereupon each Knight Companion having wrote down the Names of Nine Persons, that is of three Earls, or those of an higher Degree, three Barons, and three Knights whom they esteemed qualified to be elected, and having severally subscribed their Hands, and the same being collected by the Chancellor, were presented by him on his Knee to the Sovereign, who after inspecting them, commanded the Chancellor to declare the Prince of Orange duly elected.

The Chancellor then declared his Majesty's Pleasure for filling another vacant Stall: But whereas the Statutes forbid the Name of any Person to be put in the Scrutinies, who hath not actually received the Honour of Knighthood, Garter was therefore commanded to bring in the Duke of Devonshire, who being introduced between Garter and the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, knelt down before the Sovereign, and being knighted with the Sword of State, retired out of the Chapter Room; and the Scrutiny being collected by the Chancellor, and delivered to the Sovereign in the former Manner, the Chancellor by the Sovereign's Command declared the Duke of Devonshire duly elected; who being introduced again, was received at the Entrance by Sir Robert Walpole and the Earl of Chesterfield, the two junior Knights then present, and conducted by them to the Sovereign with the accustomed Reverences, Garter King of Arms carrying the Garter, the

the Ensign of the Order, and a Gold George hanging to a Blue Ribbon, did upon his Knee present the Garter to the Sovereign, who delivered it to his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales and the Duke, which they buckled about the Left Leg of the Duke of Devonshire, while the Chancellor read the Admonition enjoyned by the Statutes; and then Garter having with like Reverence presented to the Sovereign the Blue Ribbon with the Gold George Pendant thereto, his Majesty, assisted by his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales and the Duke, put it over the Duke of Devonshire's Left Shoulder, who was then kneeling, the Chancellor during that Time reading the Admonition enjoyned in that Case. And the Duke of Devonshire having kissed the Sovereign's Hand, and thanked his Majesty for the great Honour done him, rose up, and saluting all the Companions feverally, who made their Congratulations, he then withdrew.

And then the Chancellor declared the further Command of the Sovereign, that the other Stall which remained also vacant, should likewise be filled. Whereupon all the Companions present having given their Suffrages in the Manner above-mentioned, and the same being presented to the Sovereign, he elected Sir Spencer Compton Earl of Wilmington, lately Knight of the Honourable Order of the Bath, which he surrendered before the Chapter was held, who was introduced and invested with the Garter and George, with the same Rites as had been observed in the Case of the Duke of Devonshire. And then Garter King of Arms having called over the Names of the Companions, the Sovereign proceeded back in the same Manner as he first came into the Chapter Room.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from his Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, his Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for enabling his Majesty to apply Five Hundred Thousand Pounds out of the Sinking Fund, for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and thirty three; and for the further Disposition of the said Fund, by paying off

One Million of South-Sea Annuities; and for enabling his Majesty, out of the Monies arisen by Sale of Lands in the Island of St. Christopher, to pay the Sum of Eighty Thousand Pounds for the Marriage Portion of the Princess Royal and Ten Thousand Pounds to the Trustees for establishing the Colony of Georgia in America; and for making good all Deficiencies and Charges, by taking Broad-pieces into the Mint, out of the Coinage Duty; and for Appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament; and for issuing to the Sub-Dean, Treasurer, and Steward of the Collegiate Church of St. Peter Westminster, out of the Monies reserved for Building Fifty New Churches within the Cities of London and Westminster, and the Suburbs thereof, and for making Provisions for the Ministers of the same, Four Thousand Pounds for the Repair of the said Collegiate Church, and Twelve Hundred Pounds for finishing the Dormitory belonging thereunto.

An Act to prevent the Coining or Counterfeiting any of the Gold Coins commonly called Broad Pieces.

An Act for making perpetual the several Acts therein mentioned for the better Regulation of Juries; and for empowering the Justices of Session or Assizes for the Counties Palatine of Chester, Lancaster, and Durham, to appoint a special Jury in manner therein mentioned; and for continuing the Act for Regulating the Manufacture of Cloth in the West Riding of the County of York, except a Clause therein contained; and for continuing an Act for the more effectual punishing wicked and evil disposed Persons going armed in Disguise, and for other Purposes therein mentioned; and to prevent the Cutting or Breaking down the Bank of any River or any Sea Bank; and to prevent the malicious Cutting of Hop-Binds; and for continuing an Act made in the Thirteenth and Fourteenth Years of the Reign of King Charles the Second for preventing Theft and Rapine on the Northern Borders of England; and for reviving and continuing certain Clauses in two other Acts made for the same Purpose.

An Act to explain and amend an Act made in the Second Year of His present Majesty's Reign, Intituled, An Act for the better Regulation of Attornies and Solicitors.

An

An Act for enlarging the Time for Exportation of Tea.

An Act for the better Regulation of Luggage and Ballastage in the River Thames.

An Act for the Relief of Parishes and other Places from such Charges as may arise from Bastard Children born within the same.

An Act for the converting a further Part of the Capital Stock of the South Sea Company into Annuities redeemable by Parliament, and for setting the remaining Part of the said Stock in the said Company.

An Act for the further Encouragement of the Whale Fishery carried on by his Majesty's British Subjects.

An Act for reviving so much of the Act made in the First Year of his Majesty's Reign, Intituled, An Act to oblige Ships coming from Places infected more effectually to perform their Quarantine, and for the better preventing the Plague being brought from foreign Parts into Great Britain or Ireland, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, and to hinder the spreading of Infection, as relates to the performing of Quarantine, and preventing the spreading of Infection; and to enable his Majesty to prohibit Commerce with any Country or Place infected with the Plague, for a certain Time therein limited.

An Act to recover and preserve the Navigation of the River Dee in the County Palatine of Chester.

An Act to enable certain Persons to compound the Papers, importing to be the last Will, Codicils, and Testamentary Schedules of Richard Norton, late of Southwick, in the County of Southampton, Esquire, deceased, in the Prerogative Court of Canterbury, and to sue for Administration, with the same annexed.

An Act for appointing Commissioners to examine, state, and report, who of the Sufferers in the Charitable Corporation are Objects of Compassion, according to the Descriptions therein mentioned; and for giving Relief to such Sufferers; and for enforcing the Laws made against Foreign Lotteries; and for impowering the said Commissioners to hear and determine the Claims of such Creditors and Proprietors of the said Corporation, as have not made their Claims within the Time limited by

an Act made in the last Session of Parliament for taking, stating, and determining all the Claims and Demands of the Creditors of the said Corporation, and of all Persons claiming any Share or Interest in the Stock or Fund of the said Corporation.

An Act for making effectual such Agreement as shall be made between the Charitable Corporation for Relief of industrious Poor by assisting them with Small Sums upon Pledges at legal Interest, and their Creditors.

And to Eleven private Bills.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

THE Season of the Year, and the Dispatch you have given to the Publick Business, make it proper for me to put an End to this Session of Parliament.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I Return you My Thanks for the Provisions you have made for the Service of the current Year: I have never demanded any Supplies of My People, but what were absolutely necessary for the Honour, Safety, and Defence of Me and My Kingdom, and I am always best pleased, when the Publick Expences are supplied in a Manner least burthenfome to My Subjects.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I cannot pass by unobserved the wicked Endeavours that have been made use of to inflame the Minds of the People, and by the most unjust Misrepresentations to raise Tumults and Disorders, that almost threatened the Peace of the Kingdom; but I depend upon the Force of Truth, to remove the groundless Jealousies that have been raised of Designs carrying on against the Liberties of My People, and upon your known Fidelity, to defeat and frustrate the Expectations of such as delight in Confusion. It is My Inclination, and has always been My Study, to preserve the Religious and Civil Rights of all My Subjects; let it be your Care to undeceive the deluded, and to make them sensible of their present Happiness, and the Hazard they run of being unwarily drawn, by specious Pretences, into their own Destruction.
