W Hereas His Majesty has signified to us His Royal Pleasure, That the Parliament of this Kingdom, which now stands prorogued to Tuesday the Seventh Day of August next, be further prorogued to Thursday the Fourth Day of October next; on which Day it is His Majesty's Pleasure that they should meet to do Business; We do therefore hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament be, and accordingly the said Parliament is hereby further prorogued to Thursday the Fourth Day of October next; and that the same shall be then held at Dublin, and fit for the Dispatch of Business: Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this present Parliament are to take Notice, and to give their Attendance accordingly.

Hague, Aug. 4, N. S. The States of Holland continue their Assembly, and the Grand Pensionary being pretty well recovered, assists in it. The Place vacant in the Council of State by the Death of the Baron de Langerac, is not yet disposed of; but it is generally believed it will be filled up by M. de Bentinck, alias de Rhoon, Son to the Lady Portland, if the Proposals made by M. Vander Duyn, to resign his Command in the Regiment of Life-Guards, and his other Military Employments, provided the Troop he has in the said Regiment be given to his Son, are accepted; in which Case it is his Turn, as one of the Nobles, to have that Place. As to that vacant in the Admiralty of Amsterdam by the Death of M. de Nortwick, M. de Boetslaer has obtained the same for his Son.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June past, to establish certain Rules and Orders for

the better Government of the Charity for Relief of poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy; These are to give Notice to all such Widows as aforesaid, whose Husbands died on or since the 30th of August 1732, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth, and also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford and Woolwich, and the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale, where they may be informed of all Particulars which entitle such Widows to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose: But such Widows as live at too great Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Mr. Corbett, at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information And the Court of Assistants for Management of the said Charity do hereby give Notice, that they will meet at the Admiralty Office on Tuesday the 11th of September, at Eight of the Clock in the Morning, to receive the Claims of such Widows as shall be qualified according to the said Rules and Orders.

HIS Majesty's Plate of One hundred Guineas will be run for on Monday the Third of September next, on the round Course on the South side of Lincoln, by any Horse, Mare, or Gelding being no more than six Years old the Grass before; carrying twelve Stone three Heats: To be shewn and entred at Mr. Tho. Grey's at Waddington on Saturday in the Evening before they run: And if any Difference arises either in Betting or Running, the same to be determined by his Grace the Duke of Ancaster, or whom he shall appoint, according to such his Majesty's Orders, as will be then and there produced. On Tuesday the Fourth, will be run for on the same Course, a Purse of Twenty Guineas, by Galloways, not exceeding fourteen Hands high, to carry nine Stone Weight the highest, including Bridle and Saddle; all under to be allowed Weight for Inches according to the Rules of Horfemanship: Subscribers to pay One Guinea, Non-Subscribers Two: No Horse to start except three be entred, really and bona fide to run for the Plate, On Wednesday the Fifth, will be run for on the same Course, a Plate of Thirty Pounds Value, by any Horse, Mare, or Gelding that never won a Plate before, and no more than five Years old last Grass, which must be certified under the Hand of the Breeder: To carry nine Stone one Heat, and to pay Two Guineas Entrance.
