MLevenvolde, Master of the Horse to her Czarish Majesty, and her Minister, has not since his Return hither been with the Primate, his Highness having been very much indisposed for some Days past but is now much better, tho' he excused himself Yesterday from seeing the Emperor's Ambassador, and the Russian Ministers, who had desired an Audience of him; they went together to the Grand Marshal's, and M. Levenvolde gave him a Copy of the Czarina's Letter to the Republick, which, it is said, informs them, that unless she has such Assurances as may be depended upon, that they will not elect Stanislaus, her Troops, which are upon their March, shall be at hand to oppose him, and that she will employ all her Forces to prevent his being placed on this Throne. The Grand Marshal was desired to charge himself with the Delivery of the Original to the Primate, but he refused it, then both the Emperor's Ambassador, and the Russian Ministers, desired him to procure them as soon as possible an Audience of the Primate's Council *ad Latus*, that they might acquit themselves of the Orders of their Courts, and make the Declaration they are directed to do, and should be glad if his Highness was able to be present. The Grand Marshal told them, That he did not doubt of their having such an Audience as demanded very soon, and would speak to the Primate himself about it. Count Levenvolde required of the said Grand Marshal, that particular Care should be taken that the Characters of Foreign Ministers be under Shelter for the future from Affronts, either to their Persons or Domesticks, which had been so frequent, and that publick Notice should be given for their Safety, otherwise both he and his Brother should leave them, and their General Lesley was ordered to make severe Reprimands for the least Injury done to any one. He told the Grand Marshal in their Discourse, that above eighty Persons of great Distinction of this Republick, had sent Memorials to the Czarina before he left Petersbourg, begging of her to send Troops for their Assistance against the violent Oppressions they lie under; and that she had graciously condescended to their

Request, and their Troops were actually in the Country.

Hague, Sept. 1, N. S. The States of the Province of Holland separated on Saturday last: About the Middle of this Month they will reassemble here. Upon the pressing Instances of Count Sinzendorff, there have been newly nominated, on the Part of Holland M. Buys, Pensionary of Amsterdam, and M. Assendelit, Resident of the States at Brussels, to be Commissioners for settling the Tariff or Book of Rates in the Low Countries, and Zealand is to name a third Commissioner. M. Hartel, chief Engineer, having made a Report to the Government in what Condition he found the Places in the Netherlands garrisoned by Imperialists, is sent back to see in what Condition those Places are which are in the Hands of this State. This being the Prince of Orange's Birth-day, is celebrated by a great Number of Persons: But his Highness, to avoid a Crowd of Complimenters, is gone to dine out of Town. Letters from Warsaw arrived here this Day, confirm the Entrance of the Muscovites into Poland.
