WE have received Advices from Bergen, that the Danish Court arrived there the 13th Instant, and intended to set out on its Return to Christiana on the 17th; so that if the Wind proves fair, the King may be reasonably expected every Hour at Elsenore, where they say his Majesty purposes to disembark.

Hague, Sept. 4, N. S. The Prince of Orange taking the Air this Morning in a Four-wheel'd Chaise, had an Accident of being thrown out of it as he passed thro' a Turnpike, by one of the Wheels hitting against a Post; but his Highness has received no great Damage by it. The Post from Warsaw has again failed, so that no one here has had any Advice directly from thence with Regard to the Affairs of Poland.
