HIS Court has received Advice from Derbent, that their Troops had again beaten the Crim Tartars, who had made a second Attempt to force a Passage that Way to Persia, and that the Tartars were obliged to retire to the Mountains after they had lost about 200 Men. This Court has likewise received Advices from Constantinople, which inform them, that the Turks having entirely deseated Tachmach Culicam in two Battles, he had been obliged to raise the Siege of Babylon, and to retire with about 1000 Men, after having received two Wounds. The Prince of Bevern, who has been indisposed for some Time, is at present much better.
