Petersbourg, October 6, O. S.

THIS Court has had some Accounts from Constantinople, which give them Reason to believe that the Turks late Victory over the Persians is not so great as was given out; and it is said the Porte has given them fresh Assurances that they will not interfere with the Affairs of Poland.

Berlin, Oct. 31, N. S. Count Wratiflaw, who has been for some Time at the Court of Dresden, arrived here Yesterday Evening, in his Way to Kiel, being charged with a Commission on the Part of the Emperor to the Duke of Holstein.

Hague, Nov. 10, N. S. The Assembly of the States of Holland is fixed for To-morrow Seven-night. Letters from Germany do not mention any new Enterprizes of the French since the Reduction of Fort Kehl; and it was thought they will not undertake any, the Season being too far advanced. The Duke of Wirtemberg died the 31st of last Month, according to the Advices received here. His Successor, Prince Alexander of Wirtemberg, is at Vienna, where he some time ago embraced the Roman Catholick Religion, and married the Daughter of the Prince de Taxis, by whom he has several Children. The last Letters from Dantzick say, King Stanislaus was still there, and had assured the Magistrates, that he would in proper Time provide for their Safety and his own.

Dublin, October 30.

This being His Majesty's Birth-Day, the Great Guns were fired at the Barracks, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, who were drawn out upon Oxmantown-Green. At Noon there was a vast Concourse of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes, who appeared in great Splendour to compliment his Grace the Lord Lieutenant; before whom an Ode

set to Musick was performed. In the Evening a Play was given by his Grace to the Ladies: At Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy throughout the City: and at the Castle the Ball and the several Entertainments were distinguished by a Regularity and Magnificence unknown before in this Kingdom.
