**T**HIS Morning the Marquess de Fenelon, Ambassadour from his most Christian Majesty, and the Deputies of the States, signed the Act of Neutrality for the Austrian Low Countries, and some Hours after Mr. Finch was invited to a Conference by the said Deputies, to acquaint him with it. This Afternoon the Marquess de Fenelon dispatched an Express to his Court with the Instrument, in order to its being ratified by the King his Master. Letters from Berlin of the 17th say, that the Magistracy of Dantzick had hinted to King Stanislaus and his Party, that their Stay might be of great Inconvenience to them; upon which M. Poniatowsky and others were already retired, and that King Stanislaus himself was preparing to leave that Place. This News is confirmed by the last Letters from Dantzick.
