Naples, November 10.

AN Order has been published in the Emperor's Name, commanding all Subjects of the Kings of France and Sardinia to depart this Kingdom within a limited Time, excepting those who have married Natives of this Country, or have been settled in it Ten Years. Preparations are making with all Diligence by the Imperialists for the Defence of this Kingdom, and several German Officers are newly arrived, and others are on their Way hither.

Milan, Nov. 18. The French and Piemontese Troops left to block up our Castle, have been employed for some Days past in throwing up Earth and making Trenches in all the Avenues to it, to cover themselves against the small Shot of the Garrison. An Ingenier who adventured too near the Castle on the 11th Instant, was shot dead by a Centinel.

Paris, Nov. 29, N. S. There is an Account from Turin, by Letters dated the 21st Instant, that the Trenches before Pizzighitone were opened in the Night between the 17th and 18th. This Attack is not made on the Body of the Town, but on a Fort on the Side of the Adda which covers the Bridge of Pizzighitone. The first Approach was made with so little Noise, that the Besiegers had covered themselves before the Garrison took the Alarm. The French lost but few Men the first and second Nights. Part of their Army was to pass the Adda the 19th, to attack the main Body of the Place. Four Battallions and a Regiment of Dragoons were to march at the same Time, to take Possession of Cremona, which the Germans had abandoned some Time ago.

Hague, Dec. 4, N. S. Count d'Uhléfeld, the new Imperial Minister, has presented a Memorial, to demand in the Name of the Emperour, the States Leave to borrow Two Millions of Florins upon the Revenues of Silesia. The Place of Fiscal of the Court of Justice being vacant by the Death of M. Nobeling, is like to produce some Dissention between the States of Holland and those of Zealand, the last pretending it is their Turn to name to it, and the other being desirous to put in an Hollander. The last Advices we have from Poland differ very much: King Stanislaus continued at Dantzick, and it is pretended, by his Friends that his Circumstances are not in such a Condition as is represented by the other Party. On the other Side it is writ, that the Muscovite Army was actually

marching towards Dantzick, and would soon oblige that Town to expel King Stanislaus. What the several Advices deliver for certain is, that all Poland is in Confusion and Disorder, and the Country plundered by both Parties. They add from Dantzick, that they had there a Confirmation of the Tartars having defeated in Ukraina a Body of Muscovites and Cossacks, and killed Twelve Thousand of them.
