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Rome, Oftob. 20.

S yet we hear nothing certain of the intend ed promotion; his Holinefs, to the great fatisfaction of his Relations, c'htinu s very ftrong and he hful; This week was concluded the V riage between Signior Pietro Paulo Mellini, a Relation of the Popes, with a Niece of Signior Cr scentio, who gives her 30000 Crowns for her portion, and is in favour of this Marriage to have as is faid, a Cap at the next Promotion ; The Ambaffador of Venice is using all polfible endeavors at this Court, to obtain the Marquilate of Nemi for the Marquis Cornelio Frangipani, Subject of that State, though with what fuc-cels we cannot certainly fay : This morning was held in the Palace a Council of State, where his Holinefs with several of the Cardinals were present, the chief abject of their debate was, the prefent fad condition of the affairs of Poland, for the fuccouring of which Kingdom, it was refolved, that a cer-tain Impolition should be laid on the Ecclegiastical Estates; It is faid that Prince Renault d' Effe; will

come hither, and take upon him the Purple. Genoua, Octob. 26. The 21 inftant arrived here the Duke d Offuna, Governor of Milan with a very numerous Train, to expect the arrival of his new Durchels from Splin. The 23 Monsheur Gaumont the French Envoy parted hence for *Turin*, where he is to endeavor, as in Taid, to difpose that Duke to consent to a p c entitigention of Arms; though in the mean tame we har that the Forces of $S\mu uoy$ fell'th' last week into the Valley of Oneglia; that shey made themselves masters of that place, which was appoir the first news of the approach of the Enemy abandoned by the Governor and the whole Garsign. who retired to Porto Mauritio; and that they ar fince on their march to attack this atter place likewife. The French Gallies are still at Villa Franca.

Matrid, Off. 26. The eighth inftant Monfieur Pacts, Ambailador from the States General of the United Provinces, made his publick Entry here, with the usual Ceremony. From Alicant of the 17 instant they write, that 4 days before passed by that Rort, the Duke of Turfi's Galleys, having on board-the new Dutchels of Offuna, bound for Genoua. The French Ambassador here hath given in a Memorial concerning what lately happened in Cadi? Road, tothe St. Facques, a French thip belonging to St. Malpes, which as was faid in our last, was unfortunately blown up there.

Vienna, Octob. 30. After all the bad news we have of late had here, of the growing firength of the Rebels in Hungary, we at length receive advice, by an Express from General Cops, that he had enga-ged and defeated them near Cafchaum, killing above 1200 upon the place, and that it would certainly have been a total destruction of them all, had not a suddain and thick Fog hindred the farther pursuit of them, by which means most of them ef-

Rebels, being 1200 Men, that hath been likewile routed by our Troops; fo that it is hoped this early fuccels of the Emperors Aims, will in a fhort time reduce that Countrey to a perfect obedience; It is now faid, that the refolution concerning the march of Licutenant General Spar, with an Army of 20 or 30000 Men into Hungary is laid alide, till we hear farther from thence.

Franck fort, Novemb. 6. After the many debates that have been had here, and the various refolutions thereupon taken, concerning the proceeding of the Confederate Armies, they at length broke up the fourth inftant from their quarters in this Neighborhood, and took their way directly towards Ment? where they refolve as is faid, to pass the Rhyn, and if that Elector refuse them passage , to force it ; In the mean time from Ment? they tell us, that his Electoral Highnels having notice of their intentions, had cauled his Bridge to be broken down, and a many Great Guns planted on he Rhyn, to dispute the passage, in case they forcivly attempt it.

Mentz, Novemb. 6. The Confederate Armies are come within a League of this place, where they lye at present encamped, the discourse is various concerning their intentions of paffing the Rhyn, however, it being faid, that they have Holved to force their paffage if denyed it , our Elector hath with the advise of the Chapter here, caused his Bridg to be broken down, and at the same time hath given orders for the planting a great many Cannon on the Werf, to hinder their paffage.

Bruffels, Nov. 8. Yelterday the Dutch Forces had a general Rendesvous at Rosendael near Breda, how firong they then were, is not certainly faid; In the mean time here are many Reports concerning the march of this Army, fome will have them defigned to retake Crevecœur, or some other confiderable Post in those parts, though the general discourse is, That the Prince of Orange will march directly with this Army into the Countrey of Liege, and having farther reinforced himfelf, with feveral Troops to be drawn out of the Garrison of Maestricht , that he will endeavor to take Majerck, Vijer, Ge. at prefent in possession of the French. The Prince of Conin poffession of the French. de is we hear arrived at Mere, and is bringing a confiderable body of Men together on the Frontiers of Lorraine ; and from Alfatia they tell us , that the Duke de Mazarin, Governor for his most Christian Majesty of that Country, was lately arrived there from the French Court, with particular directions from the King, to put all things there in a good po-flure of defence. The Dutch observing the fad condition they are in, and that instead of bettering, it feems still to grow worfe and worfe, retire daily in great numbers to feveral places abroad, and particularly the Merchant and Seafaring Men; a great many have lately come and fetled at Antwerp, there they have obtained from the Magistrates an exemption from being elected into feveral employments of great charge and trouble in the Government of that City, for the space of 12 years to come; Our Let caped; fince which we hear, of an other party of the ters from Germany now well us, that the Confede_

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tate Armies are at length broke up from Franch fort, to the great joy of all the Countrey thereabouts, and are on their march towards the Rhyn, which it is faid, they intend to pass near Openheim, between Worms and Mayence.

Colagne, Novemb. 8. The French Army marches flill up the Rhyn, the Vant of which is already arrived within two Leagues of Coblent? ; In the mean time our Letters from those paits tell us, That the Imperial and Brandenburgh Troops lye at prefent over against Mentz, where they relolved to pais the Rhyn, but that Elector having cauled his Bridge there to be broken down, ai d leveral Cannon to be placed along the Rhyn, it is not known how they will proceed; but the Imperialists having a great many Boats, together in Ringou, it is thought, they may make thimfelves a pallage in fome other place; In the interim, from Limpurg on the Lacn we are told, that 1600 of the Imperial and Brandenburgh Troops were passed the Laen, though with what intentions is not known.

Amsterdam., Novemb. 7. The French plunder every day one place or an other, and that very near us ; From Woerden several parties have been sent out, as far as the Leaguer at Bodegrave, from whence they took away much plunder; The Bishop of Munfters Men have likewise plundered a very confiderable Village, almost within fight of Gronningen; The Burgers here, hegin to grow more and more unruly, and refuie to contribute any longer for the carrying on the War, the continuance of which, will certain-ly occasion firange confusion here, for all things are at present very dear, and no Traffick, by which the ordinary Man must be supported. Our Seamen are all paid off, and cashiered, who presently take Service either in Privateers or Merchant men, or elfe leave the Countrey. We long here with much expectation, after all the reports we have had of some great action to be exploited, to hear of the fuecels of it.

Ditto, Novemb. IIs The French have fome days fince burnt the Village called faceforelt, together with the goodly Buildings there of the Heer Faersvelt; the lois is the more confiderable, because moft of the Countrey people thereabouts, were retired thither with their Goods for shelter; From Htrecht they write, that two Regiments of Foot were arrived there from *Culent urgh*, for the better lecurity of that place, of which there had been fent 300 Men to Woerden, for the Rein orcement of that Garrison likewife, It is reported that th- Mareshal de Crequi is to come to Ntrecht, to Command there in the room of the Duke of Luxemburgh, who is to return to the French Court, to take poffeffion of his new Command, of Captain of the Kings Guards.

Macsfricht, Novemb. 8. We have news here that the Spaniards have beset St. Truyen, and that shey intend to do the like to Hasself. The French have lately plundered the Castle of Leuth, belonging to the Count of Floddorp, as likewise the Caffle of Stockem. We cannot yet certainly learn, what refolution the States of Liege, who are at present Affembled, have taken, concerning the railing of the T100ps, it was faid they intended to bring on foot for the better defence of that Country,

Hague, Novemb. 11. The Baron d' Isfola issome days fince returned hither from Bruffels, and hath given the States an account of some transactions he had there with the Count of Monterey. The French we hear, have been within a quarter of a mile of the Leaguer at Bodegrave, and burnt and plundered feveral Houles the reabours. At Rosendael near Breda kath been a general Rendesvous of all our Forces,

which we are told, made up in all about 20000 Men. Vice-Admiral van Nesse is gone out with the men of War under his Command, to joyn with those of the other Admiralties; it is laid, they will be in all 14 Sayl 3 and that they are to go for the Ba tique, to Convoy home cur East Countrey Fleet.

Whitehal, Novemb. 5. Yellerday the Baron de Spar, and the Sieur d' Ebenffein, Ambassadors Extraordinary from the Crown of Sweden, were Conducted by the Right Honourable the Earl of Carlifle, and Sir Charles Cotterel Mafter of the Ceremonies, in His Majeflies Coaches, followed by a great many other Coaches with fix horles apiece, of the Nobili-ty and other perfons of Quality about Town, to their publick Audience, which they had of their Majeibes in the Banqueting Houle, with the ufual Ceremonies; as they likewife afterwards had of his Royal Highness, in his Apartment here at Whitehalt; which Fone , they were Conducted to the Lady Williams House at Westminster, where they are to be Nobly Entertained at His Majeflics coft, during their Excellencies flay here.
