they belong, and entring him or themselves on board any other of our said Ships or Vessels, as aforesaid, in order to the obtaining the Bounty Money herein before granted; We do hereby likewife direct, declare, and command, that fuch Seamen and Landinen belonging to any of our Ships or Vessels of our said Royal Navy, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels, to which they shall belong, and shall enter themfelves on Board any other of our faid Ships or Vessels, in order to the obtaining the said Bounty Money, shall not only lose the Wa-ges due to them in the Ship or Vessel which they shall so leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits. And we do hereby further declare, that if such Men in our Service, who are or shall be permitted to be absent by such Tickets as aforesaid, do not repair on Board their respective Ships or Vessels by the Time allowed by such Tickets, they shall not only be liable to be impressed, but to fuffer fuch further Punishment, as by Law may be inflicted on them for such their Neglect. And we do hereby also strictly charge and command all the Captains and Officers of our Ships, and others, who shall be imployed in the impressing of Men for our Fleet, that they take particular Care not to impress or entertain any Persons whatsoever, who shall not be fitly qualified to serve in our Royal Navy.

## A PROCLAMATION.

For recalling and prohibiting Seamen from ferving Foreign Princes and States.

GEORGE R. WHEREAS we are informed that great Numbers of Mariners, and Seafaring Men, our natural born Subjects, are in the Service of divers Foreign Princes and States, to the Prejudice of our Kingdom; we have therefore thought it necessary (by and with the Advice of our Privy Council) to publish this our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby strictly charge and command all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever, and wheresoever (being out natural born subjects) who are in the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or do serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel, that forthwith they, and every of them do (according to their known and bounden Duty and Allegiance) withdraw themselves, depart from, and quit such Foreign Services, and return home to their native Countries: And further we do hereby strictly prohibit and forbid all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever (being our natural born Subjects) from entering, and do charge and command them and every of them, from henceforth to forbear to enter themselves into the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or to serve in any Foreign Ship or Vellel whatloever, without our

special Licence first had and obtained in that behalf; to all which we expect due Obedience and exact Conformity. And we do hereby publish and declare, that the Offenders to the contrary shall not only incur our just Displeasure, but be proceeded against for their Contempt according to the utmost Severities of the Law. And we do hereby declare, that if any such Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, or other Seafaring Men (being our Subjects) shall be taken in any Foreign Service by the Turks, Algerines, or any others, they shall not be reclaimed by us, as Subjects of Great Britain.

Hagud, Feb. 16, N. S. Letters from Paris relate, that a Body of Troops commanded by Lieutenant General the Marquess de Maillebois, having opened Trenches before Tortona the 26th of last Month, the Governour of that Place retired with his Garrison into the Castle on the 28th, pre-fently after which the Inhabitants of the Town gave up the Keys to the French. The Night between the 29th and 30th Trenches were opened against the Castle, and on the 12th Instant the Duke de la Tremoille arrived Express at Court, with an Account that the faid Castle had surrendred, the Garrison being allowed to retire to Mantua. The States of the Province of Holland will reassemble here the 24th Instant; their Pensionary is in so good a State of Health, that it is expected he will assist in the Assembly; and it is hoped certain Domestick Assairs that require their Determination, will then be sinally settled.
