**H**IS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

*An Act for continuing the Duties on Malt, Mum, Cyder and Perry, in that Part of Great-Britain called England, and for Granting to His Majesty certain Duties on Malt, Mum, Cyder and Perry, in that Part of Great-Britain called Scotland, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty Four; and for making forth Duplicates of Exchange Bills, Lottery Tickets, and Orders, lost, burnt, or otherwise destroyed.*

And to one Private Bill.

*Dantzick, Feb. 20, N. S.* The Saxon Minister not having complied with the Orders sent him to depart this City, an Officer and six Musketeers were sent to him, as likewise to the Russian Minister, to put them under an Arrest, and on the 15th Instant they were both conducted out of this City, under a Guard of 36 Men, towards Demmers. Some Burghers, and others who were suspected, are fled from hence. The Magistrates having ordered the Engineers to cut the Banks of the River Cladaw, it has been done accordingly, and the whole Dantzicker-Werder is under Water, as is also the Country for half a Mile round this City, by which Means the Russians will meet with some Difficulty in their Approach. On the 17th Instant a Trumpeter arrived at the Barrier of this City from General Lacy, with a Letter for the Magistrates, importing, that he had been informed that the Russian and Saxon Ministers had been put under an Arrest, as likewise two Couriers, and requiring their being set at Liberty. The Magistrates have returned for Answer, That all that had passed was without their Knowledge; that the Ministers had left their City; and that the two Couriers were not in their Hands, but in those of the Court. The general Quarters of General Lacy are at Proeft, about a Mile from this Place. By Deferters and Letters we have the Confirmation of the weak State the Russian Army is in, and that they are not as yet in a Condition to undertake any thing against this City.

*Copenhagen, Feb. 23, N. S.* The Chamber of Finances has continued since the Resignation of the chief Director, under the Management of three Deputies, M. Borneman, M. Berregaard and M. Tott, with these a Son of the late Privy Councillor Holet is now joined, and has the first Place in the Commission. This Department therefore seems now to be settled upon the Foot the

King intends it shall rest. The younger Officers are daily presenting Petitions to be employed in the Regiments appointed to march to the Emperor's Assistance, and several have been accordingly promoted. These Preparations still go forward, and as the Impediment which the Affair of Mecklenbourg might have occasioned, is now removed by the withdrawing of the Prussians from thence, there will soon be nothing but the Season to hinder the Troops from setting out.

*Berlin, Feb. 23, N. S.* M. Mardefelt is on his Return to Petersbourg, having received his final Instructions, and taken Leave of the King his Master. It is reported that two Commissaries, appointed by the Emperour to settle the March of the 10000 Prussians which are to assist his Imperial Majesty, arrived at Potzdam two Days ago. General Rhoder, who is to command that Body of Troops, went thither also this Morning.
