His Highness, with all his Retinue, is lodged at the Dean's of Christ-Church College. His Highness is gone this Morning to Blenheim, and To-morrow is to be received by the Body of the University in the Theatre.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of her Majesty's Birth-Day, her Majesty received at Noon the Compliments of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes. At Night there was a Ball. The Appearance was at both Times very numerous and extremely splendid. On this Occasion the Guns in the Park, and at the Tower were fired, and in the Evening there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other publick Demonstrations of Joy, throughout London and Westminster.
