*Hambourg, March 19, N. S.*

**O**N Monday last Baron Stain (who was formerly in the late Duke of Brunswick's Service, but now in that of the King of Sweden as Landgrave) passed through this Town in his Way to Stockholm; from whence we are informed, that it was resolved on the 27th past, O. S. in the Senate, that a Diet should be called for the <sup>14</sup>/<sub>25</sub> of May.

*Hague, March 23, N. S.* The Town of Dantzick having again applied to the States General for their Assistance, and likewise to use their good Offices with her Czarish Majesty in their Favour, Count Golofkin was Yesterday invited to a Conference with the Deputies of the States, in which those Deputies represented to him, how much their High Mightinesses are concerned for the Welfare of that Town, in the Preservation of which so many of their own Subjects are concerned; and how desirous they are that the Czarina would not come to Extremities. Count Golofkin answered, That the Czarina had no Design against the Town, but only to oblige King Stanislaus to quit it; that he was very sorry that Town had drawn upon itself so great Inconveniencies, but that he was sure her Czarish Majesty would act with the greatest Prudence on this Occasion, since it was known that the People of Dantzick were not so much to blame as some few of the Magistrates, who were willing to sacrifice the Town and the Interest of the People to their own private Views. He likewise said, that whatever happened, Care would be taken that the Dutch Merchants should not be Sufferers, and that he would acquaint his Court with what their High Mightinesses had signified to him. In the mean time it is written from Berlin, that the Muscovites waited only for their great Artillery to attack the Town in Form, having obtained a free Passage for the said Artillery through the Territories of the King of Prussia. Count d'Uhlfeld, the Emperor's Minister, has had likewise a Conference with the States Deputies, and presses still for Succours. The Commissioners of the Admiralty being sent for, arrived here Yesterday.

*St. James's, March 16.*

The Ceremony of the Marriage of the Princess Royal with the Prince of Orange, was performed on Thursday last in the Evening, and the Procession from the Palace through the Gallery to the Chapel was in the following Manner.

These stood next to the Door of the Entry into the Passage, and when they came to the Door of the Chapel, filed off, standing upon each Side.

The Master of the Ceremonies proceeded, with one of the chiefest Officers of the Bridegroom.

Gentleman Usher of the Bridegroom between the two Senior Heralds.

The Bridegroom in his Nuptial Apparel, invested with the Collar of the Garter, conducted by his Grace the Duke of Grafton, Lord Chamberlain, and the Right Hon. the Lord Hervey, Vice-Chamberlain, and supported by the Earls of Scarbrough and Wilmington, Knights of the Garter, being both Batchelors, wearing their Collars.

The Officers Attendants upon the Bridegroom followed by Pairs, those of the greatest Quality going nearest to his Person.

—Upon the Entry into the Chapel, the Master of the Ceremonies, with the Gentleman Usher, and Attendants on the Bridegroom, went to the Seats assigned for them; and the Bridegroom was brought by his Conductors and Supporters to the Stool placed for his Highness next below his Majesty's Chair of State on the Haut-pas, his Supporters retiring to their Seats, where they remained according to their Precedencies among the Peers. The Lord Chamberlain and Vice-Chamberlain return'd back to conduct the Bride, and the two Heralds return'd with them to perform other Functions.
