An Act for granting and continuing the Duties upon Salt, and upon Red and White Herrings, for the further Term of seven Tears, and for licensing the erecting new Refineries of Rock Salt in the Counties of Essex and Suffolk.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

An Act for exhibiting a Bill in this present Parliament, for naturalizing his Highness the Prince of Orange.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, intituled, An Act for laying a Duty of Two Pennies Scots, or one Sixth Part of a Penny Sterling, upon every Pint of Ale or Beer that shall be vended or sold within the Town of Montrose and Privileges thereof, for supplying the said Town with fresh Water, and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

WE the Mayor, Burgeses and Commonalty of the City of Bristol, in Common Council assembled, do congratulate your Majesty on the happy Nuptials of her Royal Highness the Princess Royal with the Prince of Orange.

We have constantly experienced your Majesty's Care for the Good of all your People in your mild and just Government over us; and the Consummation of this auspicious Marriage, is a shining Instance of your Royal Regard for the Welfare of your Subjects, as it is an additional Security to all the Blessings we enjoy. In this Scene of universal Satisfaction, permit us humbly to assure your Majesty, that our Share of the publick Joy, is equal to our Interest in the publick Advantage; and we, who have so much at Stake (as a trading City) can never too warmly acknowledge what tends to secure us a free People.
