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Whitehall, March 25.

THIS Day the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Oxford, attended by a great Number of Heads of Houses, Doctors in several Faculties, Noblemen, Masters of Arts, and other Members of that learned Body, were at St. James's in their Formalities, to congratulate his Majesty upon the Marriage of the Princess Royal, by presenting a Book of Verses upon the Occasion; when the Vice-Chancellor made the following Speech.

May it please your Majesty,

YOUR ancient and loyal University of Oxford craves Leave, in the most humble manner, to address this Book to your Majesty, on the happy Occasion of the Marriage of the Princess Royal to his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange, being ready to embrace all Opportunities of declaring their sincerest Satisfaction, and Joy, upon every prosperous Event, which may attend your Royal Person, Family, or Government.

It is a Pleasure, Sir, not easily to be express'd, that, whilst we feel the present Benefits of your Majesty's paternal Care, and Affection for us, we observe you enlarging the Foundations of our future Happiness; and adding Strength to the Cause of Virtue, and Religion, our best Support, by adopting into your illustrious Family, a Prince so eminently distinguish'd by his sincere Regard to both.

May every Branch of your Royal House, by such Alliances, contribute to the Security, and Honour of this Protestant Church, and Nation; and happily conspire in perpetuating the Blessings, which we enjoy under your Majesty's good Government. And as it has pleas'd the Divine Providence, in a singular Manner, to bless your Majesty with the Duty, and Affection of your own Children, so it is our hearty Wish, that you may always meet with the same filial Regard from all your Subjects; and it shall be our constant Endeavour, next to the Principles of Religion, and Piety to God, to instill into all, who are under our Care, those of Loyalty, and Obedience to your Majesty.

To which his Majesty was pleas'd to return this most gracious Answer,

I thank you for your Congratulations upon the Marriage of my Daughter with the Prince of Orange. The Expressions of your Zeal, and Affection for me, and my Family, cannot but be very agreeable to me: And you may always depend upon the Continuance of my Favour, and Protection.

They were introduced by his Grace the Duke of Grafton, and had the Honour to kiss his Majesty Hand.

They were the same Day introduc'd to the Queen, the Princess Royal and the Prince of Orange; and the next Day to his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the Duke, and the Princesses; when the Vice-Chancellor made short Speeches at presenting the Books, and received from each of them very gracious and obliging Answers.

The following Address has been presented to his Majesty by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, Recorder of the Town, and Lord-Lieutenant of the County and Town of Nottingham. Which Address his Majesty was pleas'd to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty, I The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council of the Town and County of the Town of Nottingham; at their Guildhall assembled the 25th Day of March 1734; and of the Gentlemen, Clergy, and Principal Inhabitants of the said Town.

Most gracious Sovereign,

WE humbly presume to join with our Fellow-Subjects in our most sincere Congratulation upon the Nuptials now happily compleated between her Highness the Princess Royal and his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange.

It must give Joy to every loyal Heart, to see a Princess of Great Britain once more so nearly united to a Prince of that illustrious House, which stands renown'd in History, for a Succession of Heroes, who have so gloriously distinguished themselves in the best of Causes; the asserting the Liberties of Mankind.

The Voice of the Nation speaks aloud their Pleasure upon this joyful Occasion, and justly applauds an Alliance which affords so happy a Prospect, and which has already been so auspicious to these Kingdoms, in the glorious King William, whose Memory must be always dear to Englishmen. To whom, under God, we owe our Preservation from the worst of Evils, Popery and Slavery; together with the Establishment and Security of our happy Constitution by the Settlement of the Crown of Great Britain in a Protestant Line; and upon a Family, whose mild and gracious Government we have happily experienced, and do most thankfully acknowledge; and which no base Arts or Insinuations of factious and ill-designing Men can ever lessen in our Esteem.

Among the many Instances of your Majesty's wife Administration, we must always look upon this additional Strength given to the Protestant Interest, and to the Cause of Liberty, by this happy Marriage, as the fullest Proof of your Majesty's Zeal and unfeigned Concern for the lasting Happiness of your People.

We beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that it shall be our Study to demonstrate the grateful Sense we have of the Blessings we enjoy under your Majesty, by the most sincere Obedience to your Majesty's Person and Government; and by doing what we can, in our several Stations, to promote Peace and Loyalty among our Neighbours.

And it is our fervent Prayer, that God would pour down the choicest Blessings upon your Majesty, our Gracious Queen, and all the Royal Family; that your Majesty's Reign over us may be long and prosperous; and that we may never want one of your Royal Progeny to fill the Throne of these Kingdoms, and to perpetuate the Happiness we at present live under, to our latest Posterity.

Hambourg, March 30, N. S. We are assured by Letters from Copenhagen, that his Danish Majesty will come into Holstein towards the latter End of next Month, and intends to review the 6000 Men which his Majesty sends to the Emperor's Assistance. These Troops are to encamp some Days on the Kelling Heath in the County of Pinneberg, five Miles from this City, and afterwards to continue their March towards the Rhine.

Copenhagen, March 30, N. S. We have this Morning begun the Embarkation of Dombroick's Regiment, which is to be transported to Eckelenford in Holstein, and from thence to march to the Rendezvous about Pinneberg. The King has deferred his Journey to Holstein till after Easter.

Hague, Sept. 6, N. S. The States General have ordered the Effects claimed by the Prince of Orange of the late King William's Inheritance to be delivered to any Person whom his Highness shall think fit to empower to receive them; against which Resolution Zealand has protested. As to the Difficulties with the King of Prussia relating to the Delivery of his Archives, they are not yet removed. The States of Holland are to assemble To-morrow. By Letters from Dresden we have Advice, that the Elector of Saxony returned thither from Poland the 27th of last Month.
