Your Majesty's great Goodness and Discernment in this Disposal of a most accomplished Princess to an illustrious Descendant of the Family of our glorious Deliverer, has justly filled all Parts of your Majesty's Dominions with a Satisfaction that must extend it self through every Nation concerned for the Preservation of the Liberties of Europe.

We have had such Experience of your Majesty's Goodness to your Subjects, and have that Confidence in your Wisdom and Conduct, that we will in all Instances endeavour to convince the World, how truly your Majesty reigns in the Hearts of your People, and how firmly we are determined to support and defend our most gracious Sovereign, and the Protestant Succession in your Royal House, the Foundation upon which our Rights, Liberties and Religion, only can subsist.
