**T**HE following Address has been presented to his Majesty by Captain Edward Stanhope: Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gentlemen, and Freeholders, assembled at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of the West Riding of the County of York, held at Pontefract the 23d Day of April, in the Seventh Year of your Majesty's Reign.

**W**E your Majesty's loyal Subjects, the Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gentlemen, and Freeholders, assembled at the said General Quarter Sessions, beg Leave humbly to congratulate your Majesty on Occasion of the late happy Marriage between her Highness the Princess Royal and his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange; a Name which breathes English Liberty and Property, and every thing dear to all true Englishmen, and true Protestants; Titles which had been long before now extinct, had it not been for this Prince's great and glorious Ancestor, that Prince of Orange, from whom we originally derive all the present Blessings of this Nation, and the greatest of all, your Majesty, and the Power we now have of thanking your Majesty for all the Hopes and Fears which arise from this Marriage: For what is it that the Cause of true Protestantism may not hope? What is it that its Enemies may not fear from this happy Union, and from that Perpetuity it promises to our present Happiness.

As your Majesty does every thing in the Power of Majesty and Goodness to perpetuate our Happiness, we in Return cannot but do every thing in the Power of Loyalty and Gratitude to perpetuate your Majesty's; and will make it our Business to convince all Men, that this our Gratitude does not con-

sist only in Words, but in Activity, and in doing all we can to chuse and send such Representatives to Parliament, as are not likely to give up those civil and religious Liberties of Englishmen, which your Majesty by this and all the Steps of your Royal Conduct, does all you can to preserve to your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects.

**W**E your most dutiful and loyal Subjects, do humbly beg Leave to present this our congratulatory Address to your sacred Majesty, upon the Marriage of the Princess Royal with his most Serene Highness the Prince of Orange, which Alliance seems to have been universally desired by your Majesty's Subjects, and the Accomplishment thereof hath given the most general Satisfaction.

Our former Alliances with that most illustrious House have always been attended with very great Advantages to our Nation, and have proved a very great Support to the Protestant Interest.

It is fresh in our Memories, and ought never to be forgotten what that great and glorious Prince King William the Third, did for the English Nation, who not only rescued and delivered these Kingdoms from the most imminent Dangers, but secured our most valuable Rights and Liberties to us in such a Manner, that the many inestimable Blessings

Blessings we have continually enjoyed under your Majesty's auspicious Reign, may, without lessening the Glories of it, be in some Measure attributed to the necessary Consequences of his Benefactions to these Nations.

We beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that we shall all of us, in our respective Stations, use our most steady and hearty Endeavours to promote and encourage an inviolable Affection for your Majesty's sacred Person and Government; and that your Reign may be easy and happy, long and prosperous, shall be our continual Prayers.

*Berlin, May 1, N. S.* On Wednesday Morning last, the Body of Prussians designed for the Emperor's Assistance, set out from hence on their March in two Columns: The one commanded by Lieutenant General Rhoder is gone to Hall, and the other commanded by Prince Leopold, the Prince of Anhalt's eldest Son, is gone to Magdebourg; at both which Places these Corps are to wait for new Orders. Some Regiments of Horse and Foot in Prussia, included in the 60 Battallions and 40 Squadrons lately ordered to hold themselves in Readiness to march, have received Counter-Orders.

*Berlin, May 4, N. S.* The Muscovite Artillery, which was at Pillau, is certainly arrived before Dantzick, and passed through the Frisch Haff, according to his Prussian Majesty's Permission. Late this Evening the Post Master General received Advice, that the Russians had begun to bombard Dantzick on the 1st Instant.

*Rotterdam, May 7, N. S.* Their Royal and Serene Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Orange, came to an Anchor this Forenoon about Ten a-Clock before the Quay, having been saluted with a triple Discharge of the Cannon of the Town and Ships lying in the River. Mess. Walpole, Finch, Sporcke and Dayrolle, immediately went on board the Fubbs Yacht to pay their Duty to their Highnesses, whom they had the Pleasure to find perfectly well. The Ministers of the several Congregations here have made their Compliments; as has the Magistracy of the Town; where there is the greatest Appearance of good Will and Joy. Their Highnesses proceed on their Journey To-morrow Morning for Amsterdam, where the Government design to shew them the same Respect they have had here.

*Hague, May 11, N. S.* Their Royal and Serene Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Orange set out from Rotterdam on Saturday last about Seven in the Morning for Amsterdam, where being arrived, they went directly on board the Yacht, and set Sail for Friesland.

At Rotterdam the same Honours were paid their Royal and Serene Highnesses as were formerly done to the Princesses Royal of England. At Amsterdam, the Guards at the Gate where they entered were under Arms, with Colours flying; and a Detachment was ordered to escort them to their Yacht, where a Deputy from the Magistrates came immediately to know if the Prince intended to make any Stay, in which Case the said Magistrates desired to come and pay their Compliments to their Royal and Serene Highnesses. The Prince excused himself from receiving them, being ready to set Sail. We have Advices from Francfort, that Traerbach capitulated on the 2d Instant.

*Richmond May 2.*

This Day Jusuph Cogia, Envoy from the Bey of Tunis, had a private Audience of Leave of his Majesty; to which he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Harrington, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies.

He had afterwards a private Audience of Leave of the Queen, being introduced by the Master of the Ceremonies.
