Hambourg, May 14, N. S.

THE Danish Troops encamped in this Neighbourhood are to be mustered this Day by the Imperial Commillary; it is thought the King of Denmark will review them To-morrow, and that they will break up next Monday and march towards the Rhine.

Hague May 18, N. S. The States of Holland separated last Saturday, and are to meet again To-morrow Seven-night, to resume several Domestick Affairs which they have left undecided. The Accounts which we have here from the Rhine advise, that all the different Bodies of the French Troops, as well that which was upon the Moselle, as the others, had joined the Duke of Berwick, who marched with a Design to bring Prince Eugene to a Battle before the Reinforcements which he expects should join him. Letters from Dantzick of the 8th say, that the Muscovites had already thrown into the City 500 Bombs; that it was said they had no more, and that the City defended itself still bravely, in Expectation of the French Succours. Those from Milan of the 7th, confirm the Imperial Troops passing the Po. Their Royal and Serene Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Orange made their Entry into Leewarden the 11th Instant with great Magnificence. The Burghers, who were under Arms, saluted their Highnesses at their Arrival with a triple Discharge; in the Evening there were Illuminations, a fine Firework played off, and all other publick Demonstrations of Joy.

The Commissioners for managing his Majesty's Stamp Revenues do hereby give Notice, that by a Clause in an Act of last Session of Parliament, intitled, *An Act for ascertaining the Duties upon Arrack*, it is (inter alia) enacted to the Effect following: That for the Relief of all Masters and Mistresses who have omitted to pay His Majesty's Duties of Six Pence in the Pound for every Sum of Fifty Pounds or under, and of Twelve Pence in the Pound for every Sum amounting to more than Fifty Pounds, given, paid, contracted, or agreed for, or any Part thereof, with Clerks, Apprentices, or Servants, within the respective Times limited by the several Acts of Parliament in that Case made, or who have omitted to insert and write in Words at Length in the Indentures or other Writings containing the Covenants and Agreements relating to such Clerk, Apprentice, or Servant, the full Sum or Sums of Money, or any Part thereof, received, or in any wise directly or indirectly given, paid, agreed, or contracted for, with or in relation to such Clerk, Apprentice, or Servant, all such Masters and Mistresses, Clerks, Apprentices, and Servants, are acquitted and discharged of and from all Penalties and Incapacities incurred by Reason of such Omissions, upon Payment of the said Rates and Duties on or before the 24th Day of June, 1734.
