Berlin, May 15, N. S.

IN the Night between the 12th and 13th Instant, an Express arrived from M. Brandt, his Prussian Majesty's Minister at the Muscovite Camp before Dantzick, who brings an Account, that on the 9th in the Evening, Count Munich caused the Fortifications on the Hills called Stoltzenberg and Bishopsberg, which command the Town, to be stormed by a very great Detachment of the Russian Army, hoping to be able to carry those Works sword in Hand; that the Action lasted from Ten at Night till Three in the Morning, when the Russians were forced to retire, leaving 3000 Men dead on the Spot, amongst whom were a great many Officers of Rank and Distinction. On Thursday last the Court removed from Potzdamm to this Town. This Morning the Regiments which come hither every Year in order to pass in Review before his Majesty, marched into Town, and next Monday is fixed for the General Review. The 10000 Prussians set out on the 10th Instant from Hall and Magdebourg on their March towards the Rhine.

Hambourg, May 18, N. S. Yesterday Morning the King of Denmark reviewed his Troops incamped in this Neighbourhood, which made a very good Appearance, and To-morrow they will break up and march to the Waterfide, in order to be embarked in a great Number of Vessels, which are to transport them cross the Elbe, from Blankenese to the Krantz, on the opposite Side, situated in the Dutchy of Bremen. It is generally believed that the Court of Denmark will remain at Altena all this Week and Part of the next, and then proceed to Oldenburg; and in the Whitfun-Holidays will go into Sleswick, and stay there a Month or six Weeks.

Hague, May 21, N. S. The last Letters from the Imperial Army are of the 14th, at which Time Prince Eugene remain'd encamped at Narbinn, and the French Army was at Buchsal, waiting for the Junction of the Forces under the Command of M. Bellisle that were lately on the Moselle. It is said that the Ten thousand Prussians were march'd to join Prince Eugene, but it was not known how far they were advanced. The last Letters from Italy of the 9th say, that the French Army is incamped behind the Lenzo and the Oglio, by which means they cover the Milanese; but that the Parmesan is exposed to the Excursions of the Germans who are at Luzara, and as soon as Count Mercy shall be sufficiently furnished with some Provisions he wanted, it is said he will march directly against the Enemy, and endeavour to bring them to Action; so that the News of a Battle is daily expected from those Parts. The States had an Account last Night from M. de Blyfwyk, their Minister at Dantzick, of the 12th Instant, that the Muscovites having the Night before attacked the Works of the riling

Ground before the Town called the Hagelberg, with Three thousand Men, and Ladders, on a Design to scale the same, were not only beat back, but most of them cut in Pieces.
