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*Heidelberg, May 22, N. S.*

**T**HE Imperial Camp at Hailbron has been reinforced within these Eight Days with 8000 Foot: The 3000 Hessians arrived there the Day before Yesterday; the Contingent of the Upper Rhine the Day following, and it was thought that the 6000 Hanoverians would arrive there the Day or To-morrow. The French Army continues still in the same Camp.

*Berlin, May 22, N. S.* We have Advice from Petersbourg, that the Czarina had entirely rejected his Prussian Majesty's Offers of Mediation with respect to Dantzick; her Czarish Majesty declaring on that Occasion, that she was resolved to oppose Stanislaus with the utmost Vigour, let the Consequences be ever so fatal with respect to herself. On Wednesday last Count Jagozinski went to Leipzick, in order to have an Interview with Count Levenwolde before that Minister comes hither. The next Day Colonel Ponikau, the Saxon Minister, set out for the same Place, having received the Elector his Master's Orders to attend him there.

*Hambourg, May 25, N. S.* We have received the Confirmation of the Dantzickers Success in repulsing the Russians; as likewise of the Arrival of the first French Succours, consisting of two Battallions, which landed at Wechselfmunde on the 11th Instant without Opposition; but we have no Account of those Troops being got into the Town of Dantzick. The Muscovites have lost above 2000 Men, several Officers, and a great Number of their Engineers, in the last Attack; so that it is thought they will be obliged to raise the Siege, if they are not soon reinforced by the Saxons, who are said to be

in full March towards their Camp. If the Indisposition of the Margrave of Culmbach, the Queen of Denmark's Brother, who is very ill of an Ague and Fever, does not cause some Alteration, the Court of Denmark will set out for Oldenbourg To-morrow, the Troops having now all passed the Elbe, and being upon their March to join the Imperial Army.

*Hague, May 28, N. S.* According to some Advices received here from the Rhine, the two Armies were still in their former Camps; but if the Marques de Fenelon's Accounts are true, Phillipsbourg is actually besieged with an Artillery of about 100 Pieces of Cannon and 40 Mortars. From the Camp before Dantzick; some Letters say that the French Succours had landed at Fort Wechselfmunde, but were reembarked; whereas according to the Dutch Minister's Advices from thence, those Succours were landed at the said Fort, and designed to march directly to the Town through the Country of Nerung, crossing the Vistula by the Favour of the Cannon of the said Town. On the other Hand, it is reported here and upon the Exchange at Amsterdam, that King Stanislaus is dead, the Report being grounded upon a Letter writ by the Postmaster of Emmerick, that a Courier had passed through that Place, and declared he was going to the French Court to carry that News; which is very much doubted, the last fresh Letters from the Muscovite Camp mentioning nothing of it. It is said that the Marshal de Villars having demanded to be recalled from Italy, he has obtained Leave from the King his Master to return.
